Sixty libraries nationwide to receive Isaac Bashevis Singer Centennial Grants

After an open nationwide competition, The Library of America, the American Library Association (ALA), and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) have selected 60 public and academic libraries from 32 states—from Alaska to Florida—to receive \$450 grants to develop programs about Isaac Bashevis Singer that will be free and open to the public. They will also receive the three-volume hardcover authoritative collection "Isaac Bashevis Singer: Collected Stories" to be published by The Library of America in July 2004.

The library competition is one part of the 2004 centennial celebration for the master storyteller Isaac Bashevis Singer, who in 1978 became the seventh American to be awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature. The Singer centennial, whose theme is Becoming an American Writer: The Life and Works of Isaac Bashevis Singer, is directed by The Library of America and features a multifaceted program of public readings, panels, exhibitions, and workshops exploring Singer and the immigrant literary experience, supported by the NEH and produced with cultural institutions nationwide, including the ALA, from February 2004 to January 2005. In July, Singer will join the authoritative Library of America series in a three-volume edition of his collected stories and a fully illustrated companion Album.

The ALA Public Programs Office will assist the winning libraries with programming guidelines and practical support.
