## WANTED: A NEW LIBRARY

Mrs. Imogene Johnson (Office for Intellectual Freedom), a member of the Board of Directors of Lincoln Central Association (one of seven communitywide organizations comprising the Lincoln Park Conservation Association) is asking for citizen support in a communitywide effort to get a new library.

Plans for the library have been developed by the distinguished sculptor, Milton Horn. They include a lecture hall, listening room, exhibition gallery, and three patios--for discussion groups, children's storytelling, and a "chatting area." Mr. Horn said a library at this location would be unique in that it would serve the "multicultural, multi-ethnic, multidenominational, and multi-economic strata" of that area.

The site of library is part of a current Urban Renewal Project and would be at the corner of Wisconsin and Sedgwick.
