## LIBRARY BUILDINGS AWARD PROGRAM

The 10th Annual Library Buildings Award Program is now open for entries. The awards, sponsored by the American Library Association's Library Administration and Management Association and the American Institute of Architects, recognize distinguished accomplishment in library architecture by an American architect for any library in the United States or abroad. The awards will be presented at the 1980 ALA Annual Conference in New York City.

The program is designed to encourage excellence in the architectural design and planning of libraries. All entries should be library buildings designed by registered architects practicing professionally in the United States. The libraries should have been erected anywhere in the United States or abroad and must have been occupied not earlier than December 3, 1972, and not later than December 3, 1978.

The program is open to all types of libraries and awards are given for the following categories: new buildings, additions, renovations, and adaptive reuse.

A \$75 non-refundable registration fee for each building entered must be paid by the entrant (payable to the American Institute of Architects) and sent with the architect's name, firm, address, and library name, address, and date of occupancy. Entries must be submitted with fee no later than December 13, 1979.
