## AAMES Executive Board Committee Minutes

Executive Board Meeting

June 28, 2014 – 8:30-10:00AM

Bally's Palace 5, Las Vegas

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*Brief Description:* This is an AAMES executive board meeting held at the ALA 2014 Annual Conference in Las Vegas. Attending board members discussed the future of the section, under the pressure from the ACRL that asked for a possible merger of the section into another section or changing to an interest group due to the falling numbers of membership. The board members had an opportunity to share their thoughts and communicate with ACRL's two representatives and shared concerns about the available transition options.

Started at 8:30AM

Attending committee members introduced to each other. Shuyong Jiang mentioned that the ACRL liaison, Marilyn Ochoa, could not attend the meeting because of family reasons.

Shuyong started her reporting by pointing to some house-clean issues

- Her term as the section chair will end after this ALA conference
- AAMES will need to elect a third Member-at-Large. It will be the nominating's responsibility to undertake the election
- Shuyong then reported jobs done during her term from 2013 to 2014
- Made efforts to increase the visibility of the section and the number of members
- Organized a Mid-Winter virtual meeting to discuss relevant topics
- Used various channels to communicate with ACRL leaders to convey the section's rationale and ask for an extension of possible AAMES merger/changing

Jingfeng Xia reported as the incoming chair that he had appointed chairs and members to AAMES' all five committees, thanks to a group of qualified volunteers. Some of the committees have already taken over business. For example, the conference programs committee members have started working on projects for the future conferences.

The committee roster is listed below:

He recommended a taskforce group that will work on a proposal requested by the ACRL for AAMES' future directions. This recommendation was taken by other board members. Jingfeng agreed to lead the group and the following people will be the taskforce members: Deepa Banerjee, Shuyong Jiang, Yue Li, David Hirsch, Hong Cheng, and Qian Liu (some members need to be consulted).

Board members discussed other issues as well, including strategies to recruit new members:

- Every board member is encouraged to introduce 5–10 new members who are in related area studies
- Consider reaching out to public libraries a rapid increase of library clients with Asian, African, Middle Eastern, and other international background has been obvious (some members pointed out that the ACRL does not handle public library membership. They assumed librarians outside the ACRL may not be eligible to participate in ACRL).
- Consider an expansion of member recruitments to overseas librarians (some members pointed out that international members must be ALA and ACRL members before becoming eligible to participate in ACRL)
- Board members also discussed several options
- Merging to other area studies sections to form a new International Studies section
- Changing the section's goals and mission to become a History Studies section
- Changing to an Asian American section, similar to current ACRL's African American section (This change may easily reach the goal of membership quotes, but may decrease diversity).

Two ACRL representatives came and joined the board's conversation. Both of them introduced ACRL's concern on the decreasing membership of AAMES, and suggested the merger/changing option in order to reduce ACRL's management burdens. According to them, AAMES should have a transition plan that would take effect in 2017 – the date by which the board had set for any changes to become effective.

AAMES board members made their voice strongly by stating that

- Most AAMES members are area studies librarians who have multiple affiliations with other professional associations such as the Association for Asian Studies, Middle East Librarians Association, Africana Librarians Council, CONSALD (Committee on South Asian Libraries and Documentation). Many of them have a more distant connection to the ACRL than to other associations. Changing AAMES from a section to an interest group will make these members feel marginalized and thus negatively affect their relationship with the ACRL. AAMES members may find their interest of area study in other ALA divisions or library organizations.
- As a region-based section, AAMES is unique from many other ACRL sections such as the Instruction section. This difference needs to be taken into consideration when using metrics-alone (the 400 threshold) to judge the conditions of AAMES.

- AAMES represents a group of minorities in contrast to the mainstream ACRL membership that is consisted of white librarians as the majority. The ACRL leaders shall have crafted appropriate policies to promote and protect diversity.
- Since the ALA is going to lift the 2-section only limitation for its members to select more sections for free, AAMES requires more time to figure out workable plans to increase its membership size and observe changes of its situation, if any.

The ACRL representatives will continue to share the concerns with the full ACRL Board. Although demonstrating and understanding for the uniqueness of AAEMS, the reps suggested that a merger is only one option. There is the option also of transitioning to an Interest Group, and also of increasing membership, especially in light of the ALA pricing rule change (no charge for additional sections above 2). They agreed that making AAMES strong is a goal of both AAMES and ACRL. They encouraged the section board to continue thinking about the transition options and planning accordingly. At the same time, they reiterated the importance of making efforts to increase the number of AAMES members, if that is the direction in which the AAMES board believes would be of greatest benefit.
