We will discuss the following topic:

Aren't There Any Good Books Here? (Un)Required Reading and the Academic Library

Long, long ago in a land far, far away, when libraries were primarily focused on connecting readers with printed journals and books, academic libraries had the luxury of promoting reading for self improvement, reading for enrichment, even reading for pleasure. This has changed, as we all know, as our budgets and our time have been drawn to other adventures and battles. It seems now one of the most difficult and rare of reference questions for the academic librarian is "How can I find a good book to read here?"

Is it time for the academic library to re-engage with the culture of the book? The National Center for Education Statistics' latest National Assessment of Adult Literacy scores (released in December 2005, see link below) reveals a significant decline in college graduates' literacy in English. Could or should the academic library make a difference in student literacy rates by actively promoting reading? And how would we do that?

Some points for us to ponder:

What is the culture of the book today? Is it a print culture?

Audio? Visual?

What does it mean to promote reading?

Who is taking the lead in this on our campuses?

* Can libraries form partnerships with other campus units (writing centers, English departments, academic success initiatives, first year experience programs, teaching and learning committees, etc) to collaborate for greater impact on student literacy?

How many libraries are actively involved in a one-book,

one-campus initiative on their campus? What does this entail?

What kinds of programs are academic libraries staging that

feature readings, reading promotion, or some other related idea?

What kind of reading is being promoted and what is it being

called? Recreational? Extracurricular? Leisure?

* Are libraries resurrecting a browsing collection? Is there resistance to promoting recreational reading? And where does it come from?

* What role does technology play? Are there Web sites or Web-based tools that can help librarians in this arena?
