1. San Francisco Program: All the minority concuses will work together, instead of doing separate programs, to plan the President's Program with Presidential Tours. AILA will coordinate cultural activities. REFORMA will coordinate tours. Al Milo in in charge of the President's Program. Beaudin will be the contact person. Roggia and Salabiye will come up with a tour site and contact them. All our plans are now up in the air, but in the long run it will produce a better program. All the groups will come together to give an award to Frank A. Stevens. This award may be made into an annual contribution to a minority library in his name.
2. We will award Tom Blumer a citation for his work with the Newsletter.
3. Equity at Issue: The report was endorsed by the OLOS-AILA joint committee.
4. Presidential Program Committee: Representative from OLOS-AILA will be Sally Roggia.
5. Document on ALA Federal Legislative Policy: If we have any comments on this policy get them to Rhonda Taylor by 1 October 1986.
6. REFORMA/OLOS Representative on the San Francisco Program is Susan Luevano. She announced that the program will be on membership for middle managers. The program will include reactions by four representatives of minority groups. Invitations to those reactors will go out in September. We should nominate someone to represent us. Nominations should be sent to Alfreda Chapman at University of North Carolina, Chaptel Hill by September 1.
7. Lotsee Smith reported on TRAILS: They are doing the job as mandated. But the program will die next year. Efforts are being made to find ways to continue assistance once the program ends. She may approach BIA for funding or ask all of the Tribes directly.
8. Frank Stevens reported on LSCA: Title IV has a contractual component. Tribes could contract to keep the TRAILS program or some of its parts alive by contracting \$100 - \$200 a piece. Or they could contract with OLOS to keep the components going. He reviewed the LSCA Title IV grant program booklet and introduced the representative from the program in Hawaii, Mahealani Merryman. This year they have 2.2 million. They had 188 basic

grants at 3,277 each, \$552 thousand for Hawaii, and 16 special grants for a little over one million.

9. Alice Solomon reported on the Bureau of the Census, Community Information Services in Seattle. They need Indians in the Bureau to better count Indians. The 1990 Census now has an Indian Advisory Board. They also have advisory boards for Asians, Blacks, Hispanics. They will give workshops on use of the 1990 Census to librarian groups. Write for specific information. Chair of the Indian Advisory Board is Loranth Warwick, Planner, Yakama Indian Nation, P.O. Box 151, Toppanish, Washington, 98948. The person in charge of outreach is Mike Freeman, 301-763-4558. Edna Pisano in Washington, D.C. is in charge of the department on race and ethnicity.
10. Revision of Educational Brochures: We need to do it. Copies will be sent to the Committee for comments. Dennis Reed and Debra Schaffer volunteered to begin the revisions.
11. Elections: Rhonda Taylor and Janice Beaudin were persuaded to continue in their offices for another year. This was unanimously acclaimed by the committee.
12. Suggestions for speakers for the San Francisco program included Mankiller, Momaday, and Deloria.
