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Planning." So often we get stuck in our current jobs, not knowing how to progress. And, if you do want to make a career shift, how do you go about doing so? Here, I hope to summarize some of the presenters' knowledge and ideas. The purpose of the talk was to help us craft an Individual Development Plan (IDP). An IDP is a written plan that highlights your career goals and outlines what steps you can take to achieve them. The great thing about an IDP is that it can be used to identify short term (one year), mid-term (two years), and long term (five years) career goals. Within each timeframe, think about your objective, what learning activities will get you there, any deadlines, the estimated cost, the learning success criteria, and lastly, give yourself time to reflect. It helps to really think about what you want out of your career and fosters a sense of self-awareness. - Looking for an easy promotional program to highlight all the incredible children's services that you are already providing? If so, consider celebrating Take Your Child to the Library Day (TYCTTLD), which seeks to raise community awareness about the importance of the library in the life of a child. The official date for 2016 is Saturday, February 6; however, some libraries are celebrating all throughout February, so there is still time to join the program. TYCTTLD is not new; in fact, this grass-roots program was first held in 2011 and continues to gain more momentum as more libraries get on board. The organic beginnings of the celebration make it an easy and natural fit for public libraries to adopt as their own. TYCTTLD was created by Connecticut librarians Nadine Lipman (Waterford Public Library, retired) and Caitlin Augusta (Stratford Library) and stewarded by the Connecticut Library Consortium, a statewide membership collaborative for all types of libraries.  presidency, has now become a fullfledged PLA service known as Project
 Outcome, providing over 900 registered
 users with the outcome measurement
 tools, resources and support needed to
 measure the true impact of their library



services and programs. Over 200 public libraries are currently using the Project Outcome survey tools to measure the outcomes of at least one program or service and nearly 5,000 surveys have been aggregated into the Project Outcome Data Dashboards. In just six short months after launching in June, Project Outcome has quickly met the public library demand and desire for standardized performance measures and continues to expand toward more advanced data collection. Brendan Dowling Talks to Abby Geni

Abby Geni's debut novel, "The Lightkeepers," is a terrifically suspenseful novel detailing a year in the life of Miranda, a photographer on a

secluded biological research station on the Farallon Islands. Here she discovers a world where danger is omnipresent, whether in the form of the animals the scientists are researching or the scientists themselves. A few months into her stay, one of the biologists is found dead, the result of an apparent accident, and soon other mysterious events occur. The Lightkeepers delivers a tightly plotted mystery while also offering keen insight into the relationship humans have with the natural world; it also contains perhaps the most terrifying scene involving mice ever written. Entertainment Weekly hailed the book as "not to be missed," and Geni was cited by Barnes and Noble as one of its Discover 2016 Great New Writers.
