- It seems that everyone in the United States is glued to the story about Flint and
  - the water crisis. What role does a public library play in a civic crisis such as this? Flint Public Library (FPL) has defined three specific ways in which the library supports the local community. How does the library fit into the solutions for the longer term issues? First, and perhaps



most importantly, FPL staff are actively engaged in the conversations about what to do and how to mobilize resources. "We are at the table," says Kay Schwartz, Library Director. "We have to know who is doing what and how people can get help. Flint has a well-developed network of organizations that collaborate effectively. We don't need to create the solution. - The Toronto Public Library is working on installing a book-lending kiosk at Toronto Union Station, which services approximately a quarter of a million commuters daily. TPL hopes to have the kiosk up and running by April 2016 and to increase its library user base. The project is modeled after similar book-lending systems that already exist in the United States in places like Pittsburgh and San Diego, and the Bay Area, as well as in Europe, Japan, and other parts of Canada. It's not just going to be books; the plan is to lend out DVDs, video games, and even e-books, as well as popular fiction and nonfiction titles. If the pilot program succeeds, additional kiosks will be put in place throughout the rest of Toronto. Read more in "Toronto Public Library Installs Book Kiosk at Union Station."
- Providing equal access to all library patrons is an essential component of every library's mandate. In fact, the ALA Mission Statement asserts that librarians must "ensure access to information for all." With that in mind, the ALA Task Force on Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion hosted a workshop at ALA Midwinter on how librarians can become more aware of and even work against systemic racism: "If I Hadn't Believed It, I Wouldn't Have Seen It: Exploring Systemic Racism and Its Implications for Our Lives and Work." - Trends are showing a flattening of the e-book explosion. According to the Association of American Publishers, e-book sales fell by 11 percent through third quarter of 2015. Five years ago, experts predicted e-book sales would become 50 percent of the book sales market. They also predicted that the sales of e-books through online retailers would cause brick-and-mortar stores to decline. While e-book sales did increase exponentially, we have a seen a flattening of this trend. Even the marketplace is beginning to demonstrate physical presence has its place. • The Library Board of the Park Ridge Public Library, in a suburb of Chicago, has

enacted a new policy: a \$10 per hour fee for using the library space to tutor children. This applies to for-profit as well as not-for-profit tutors. The policy was enacted February 1, 2016, but the hourly fees were not applied until March 1 so that patrons had time to adjust to the



new rule. The overall community response so far appears to be negative, as parents worry about where their children can now go to be tutored. A local pastry shop and eye care clinic are offering up space in their facilities to be used for tutoring purposes at no cost and no pressure to purchase their items.
