**K.G. Saur Award for Best C & RL Article recipients named**

"Literature Reviews and Inaccurate Referencing: An Exploratory Study of Academic Librarians" (November 1992) by Peter Hernon and Cheryl Metoyer-Duran and "Reconciling Pragmatism, Equity, and Need in the Formula Allocation of Book and Serial Funds" (March 1992) by Charles B. Lowry are the 1993 recipients of the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL) K.G. Saur Awards.

The awards, \$500 donated by K. G. Saur, are given to authors to recognize the most outstanding article published in College and Research Libraries during the preceding volume year.

"These two articles represent the best of all the articles published in C & RL in 1992," said Anne Woodsworth, chair of the K.G. Saur Award for Best C & RL Article Committee. "The Award Committee believes that if articles published in the future can achieve this level of quality, the journal would be greatly enriched."

Using focus group interviewing, "Literature Reviews and Inaccurate Referencing" explores the views of the Association of Research Libraries librarians about the literature of library and information science.

Hernon is a professor at the Graduate School of Library and Information Science, Simmons College in Boston, Mass.

Metoyer-Duran works at the Graduate School of Library and Information science, University of California, Los Angeles.

"Reconciling Pragmatism, Equity and Need in the Formula Allocation of Book and Serial Funds" discusses the different features and uses of the matrix formula which allocates funds for monographs and serials based on disciplinary needs and publishing patterns. It also explores the appropriate limits formulas may have as allocation tools.

Lowry is director of libraries at the University of Texas at Arlington.

The awards will be presented on Monday, June 28, at the ACRL President's Program during the American Library Association (ALA) Annual Conference in New Orleans.
