About Our Group

Our group was launched in 1970; we're just a year younger than our parent division in ALA, the Social Responsibilities Round Table. We work to get more & better gay materials into libraries & out to readers. and to deal with discrimination in libraries. (For our story up to summer 1975, see chapter "Combatting the Lies in the Libraries" in THE GAY ACADEMIC, edited by Louie Crew, ETC Publications 1977). Our membership is informal & consists of those individuals who are actually working on one or more projects. We get about \$200 a year from SRRT (about the most SRRT can give any of its task forces). For the rest of our expenses we count on donations & taking out of our own pockets. So we're happy to get contributions for our work! Make checks payable to "Barbara Gittings --TFGL." Every bit helps & is appreciated! Where will your donation go?

- Our how-to booklet, for gay groups and individuals, on ways to get gay materials into their public & school libraries. Due fall 1978. Estimated printing cost, \$125.

- Our survey of gay job discrimination in libraries. Copies of the questionnaire are available at all our events at this ALA conference, and by mail on request. Printing questionnaire, \$90.

- Gay Film Festival. Far costlier than our usual program-on-a-shoestring. While the films are supplied on courtesy basis, we have to rent screens & projectors at set prices, pay union operators, return films, etc. Each show costs about \$110.

- A completely new, 6th edition of our Gay Bibliography, due early 1979. Cost not yet known but letter postage alone to collect and check info may run to \$100.

- An examination of what encyclopedias say--and don't say--about homosexuality, and recommendations for changes.

 - Word Is Out Mariposa Film Group, 1977, 125 mins. (dist.: New Yorker Films, 43 West 61st, NYC, NY 10023). The varieties and similarities of gay experience in America, revealed through interviews with 26 gay women and men.
- Mon. June 26, 2-5 pm. Palmer House, PDR 18 Gay Film Festival II
 - <u>Dichotomy</u> Marshall Goldmann, 1974, 7 mins. (dist.: Multi Media Resource Center, 1525 Franklin, San Francisco, CA 94109). Scenes of a happy gay male couple belie the homophobic soundtrack.
 - <u>Sandy and Madeleine's Family</u> Sherrie Farrell et al., 1974, 30 mins. (dist.: Multi Media Resource Center, address above). A lesbian couple and their struggle to keep custody of their children; includes Margaret Mead commenting on the nuclear family.
 - What About McBride? Tom Lazarus, 1974, 14 mins. (dist.: CRM/McGraw-Hill Films, 110 15th St., Del Mar, CA 92014). Discussion-starter for high-school audiences: two boys argue about a third boy suspected of being gay.
 - Lavender Colleen Monahan & Elaine Jacobs, 1972, 13 mins. (dist: Perennial Education, Box 855, Highland Park, IL 60035). A glimpse at the life of a lesbian couple, one a seminary student. (She has since become a librarian and will be introduced.)
 - Rollin' With Love Chic Thompson et al., 1977, 5 mins. (dist.: Focus Interntl., 1 E. 53rd, NYC, NY 10022). Animation: real tennis balls act out typical gay situations.
 - <u>BlackStar: Autobiography of a Close Friend</u> Tom Joslin, 1977, 94 mins. (dist.: Alchemedia, 193 Nonotuck St., Florence, MA 01060). Growing up gay and a filmmaker, as seen by his parents, his brothers, his lover and himself.

 - Home Movie Jan Oxenberg, 1973, 12 mins. (dist.: Iris Films, Box 5353, Berkeley, CA 94705). The unfolding of her lesbianism during conventional childhood & school days.
 - <u>A Position of Faith</u> Michael Rhodes, 1973, 18 mins. (dist.: United Church of Christ Audio-Visuals, 1505 Race St., Philadelphia, PA 19102). Should an openly gay person be ordained to the ministry? A California church debates and decides.
 - <u>A Woman's Place Is in the House: A Portrait of Elaine Noble</u> Nancy Porter and Mickey Lemle, 1975, 29 mins. (dist.: Texture Films, 1600 Broadway, NYC, NY 10019). The first openly gay legislator in Massachusetts: her trials and triumphs.
 - <u>A Comedy in Six Unnatural Acts</u> Jan Oxenberg, 1975, 25 mins. (dist.: Iris Films, address above). Spoofs the stereotype images of lesbians: the wallflower, stompin' dyke, child-molester, role player, seductress, and non-monogamous right-on sister.
 - <u>Gay USA</u> Arthur J. Bressan Jr. & David Pasko, 1977, 73 mins. (dist.: Artists United, Box 1526, 625 Post St., San Francisco, CA 94109). Festive Gay Pride parades in four cities, intercut with telling interviews with participants and bystanders.

 - <u>In the Best Interests of the Children</u> Iris Films/Iris Feminist Collective, Inc., 1977, 53 mins: (dist.: Iris Films, address above). Eight lesbian mothers, their children, their custody cases; includes opinions by a lawyer and a social worker.
 - Gay or Straight: Is There a Choice? 1976 (Canada), 26 mins. (dist.: Document Associates, 211 E. 43rd, NYC, NY 10017). Gay people speak for themselves and their natural feelings; psychologists and a psychiatrist give varying views.
 - <u>I'm Not One of 'Em</u> Jan Oxenberg, 1976, 3 mins. (dist.: Iris Films, address above). A roller derby spectator unloads about her experiences with lesbianism.
 - <u>Some of Your Best Friends</u> Kenneth Robinson, 1972, 40 mins. (dist.: Film Distrib. Center, USC, Univ. Park, Los Angeles, CA 90007). Interviews with a lesbian and a gay man anchor scenes of gay gatherings and a gay confrontation with psychiatrists.

 - <u>August and July</u> Murray Markowitz, 1973 (Canada), 90 mins. (dist.: New Cinema Enterprises, 35 Britain St., Toronto, Ont., Canada M5A 1R7). Documentary about two women who love each other, and their first summer together.
 - <u>We're Not Afraid Anymore</u> Stuart Arden, 1974, 27 mins. (dist.: Parnassus Productions, 6311 Yucca St., Hollywood, CA 90028). A touch-many-bases documentary; includes gay preacher Rev. Troy Perry.
