The great Gertrude Stein--uppity, witty, egotistical, charming -- will be brought to life by Pat Bond at the Gay Task Force program during the 1979 conference of the American Library Association.

In Bond's one-woman presentation, Stein is humorously recreated through quotes from her work embellished with little-known facts about her early years in the U.S., her life in Paris with Alice B. Toklas, and the many famous artists who graced their salon, including Hemingway, Picasso, and Zelda and F. Scott Fitzgerald.

Pat Bond is a seasoned actress who is still best known as the ex-WAC in the film "Word Is Out" (shown nationwide on PBS-TV) giving a comic yet poignant account of gay life in the army and the closeted 40's.

### About Our Group

The Gay Task Force of American Library Assn. was formed in 1970. We are just a year younger than our parent division in ALA, the Social Responsibilities Round Table.

We work to get more and better gay materials into libraries and out to users, and to deal with discrimination against gays in libraries. (For our story up to summer 1975, see "Combatting the Lies in the Libraries" in The Gay Academic edited by Louie Crew, ETC Publications, 1978.) Membership is informal; the members at any time are those actually working on projects.

Some of our key accomplishments:

-- Launching the Gay Book Award (see below)
-- Getting ALA to pass resolutions in 1971
and 1977 supporting the rights of gay people
as librarians and as library users.
-- Doing a survey to get the facts about job
discrimination against gays by libraries.
-- Presenting lively programs at ALA conferences. Examples: "Sex and the Single Cataloguer" (1971); "Let's Not Homosexualize the
Library Stacks" (1974); "The Children's
Hour: Must Gay Be Grim for Jane and Jim?"
(1975); "Serving the Fearful Reader" (1976);
Gay Film Festival (1978).
