

STONEWALL BOOK AWARD 50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATING & PRESERVING THE VOICES OF LGBTQ+ AUTHORS

Background

The Rainbow Round Table (RRT) is the oldest queer professional association in the United States and was established in 1970 as the "Task Force on Gay Liberation." Recognizing a need to capture and preserve its history, RRT leaders enlisted cohorts of Emerging Leaders (2017 & 2018) and later the Archive Project Ad hoc Committee to launch a digital archive and oral history project. Project

Continuing our project from the previous EL Team who built an online archive for the Round Table. We built out a [media archive](#) by collecting oral histories of current and former RRT members. The existing collection is expanding to include the diverse histories of Stonewall Book award authors and their contributions, along with a [digital exhibit](#) dedicated to the celebrating first gay book award and the Dallas conference of 1971.

Learnings

For projects with similar goals and scope, carefully assess records management practices, ever-changing technology offerings and pricing, web hosting options, standard operating processes and diverse representation across participants and lived experiences.

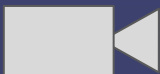

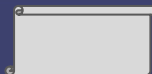
Interviews:

The interviews are being transcribed and will be uploaded to the RRT Oral History site by the start of Q3. A [new page](#) has been created on the site to support this new collection

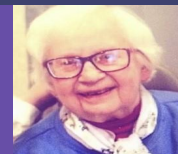


Documentation:
