...that FAFLIG can trace its ancestry back to 1944, when ALA's Division of Public Libraries established a Service Librarians Section?

...that military and federal libraries were represented by separate ALA round tables until 2001, when they merged to form the Federal and Armed Forces Libraries Round Table (FAFLRT)?

...that the FAFLIG Manual charges the group's leadership with the responsibility of upholding "the spirit of public service" and "the ideals of the Republic?"

The FAFLIG Executive Committee would like to thank Julie Arrighetti (Chief Librarian of the Ralph J. Bunche Library, U.S. State Department) and Julius Jefferson (Head of Research and Library Services, Congressional Research Service) for their presentations in September and November 2021 respectively.

In 2021, the Museum & Library launched its current exhibition, *Drawn to Combat: Bill Mauldin & The Art of War*, which covers two-time Pulitzer Prizewinning cartoonist Bill Mauldin's work about our nation's time of war, civil rights, and social justice. Building on the success of this project, the Museum & Library released a compelling virtual tour offering highlights of 100+ works that cover Bill Mauldin's life and work.

Look ahead to March 31st for the beginning of the annual On War Military History Symposium. This year's symp-

roundtable discussion featuring an exciting list of scholars and historians focusing on the current state of military history and the role that museums and historians play in its commemoration.

In May, a stirring new exhibit will explore the reality of life as a prisoner of war, the aftermath recovery of being captured, and answer the questions of what these men experienced and what those experiences tell us about the perseverance of citizen soldiers.
