WE ARE EXCEPTIONALLY FORTUNATE TO HAVE DR. S. V. MARTORANA AS GUEST MODERATOR for the panel discussion "The Library Serves the Whole Junior College." As Specialist for Community and Junior Colleges in the United States Office of Education, Dr. Murtorana is giving special attention to research projects in junior college education. He is well-known in the American Association of Junior Colleges as an active participant for many years. At the Salt Lake City Convention of the AAJC, last March, Dr. Martorana spoke on "Coats off to the Future" as part of the Convention theme "Nats off to the past; coats off to the future." Before coming to the Office of Education, he was Dean of the General College and Pre-Professional Division of Ferris Institute, Big Rapids, Michigan. Previously, he was Associate Professor of Junior College Education and Consultant to Junior Colleges in Washington at the State College of Washington. In the summer of 1953, he helped stimulate the junior college movement in Alaska when he served as visiting Professor of Education at the University of Alaska. Dr. Martorana is a graduate of New York State College for Teachers and holds the M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Chicago.

STANDARDS MONOGRAPH COMMITTEE. The Committee has been hard at work on the Monograph this year. It has been a bigger job than any of us had anticipated. Besides the standards, the monograph will include a bibliography on standards by Orlin Spicer: a survey of library standards as they appear in the statements of the various accrediting agencies, prepared by Miss Ruth Scarborough; a history of the Junior College Section, to be condensed from a masters thesis written by Mrs. Catherine Brubeck; and an introduction summarizing the history of the work on standards by Miss Catherine Cardew, Chairman of the Standards Monograph Committee. Section members breathed a sigh of relief when the announcement was made that the standards had been adopted, but we did not understand the big job ahead for the Monograph Committee, Catherine Cardew writes: "It's amazing, the number of things that have come up to slow it up." She is now giving the manuscript the "once over" before sending it to the Publications Committee of the Association of College and Reference Libraries. It must be approved for publication by this Committee before tentative production plans can be made. We hope to be over the last hurdle soon and on our way to the publication date.
