SAN FRANCISCO PROGRAM

On Saturday June 27, CJCLS presented its program, Megabytes Without Megabucks to a standing room only crowd of over 200. Dan Koenig of Piedmont Community College set the tone of his presentation: "In ancient times receiving so much for so little was called a miracle, today, it's called a microcomputer."

Over the last 7 years Piedmont (2,000 FTE and 25,000 Volumes) has systematically automated its library at a cost of approximately \$10,000. Koenig assured the group that, due to improvements in hardware a similar project could now be done for less. Koenig's presentation was entirely practical; a step by step explanation of what Piedmont did and how to do the same yourself. In sharing his experiences, he had numerous recommendations, suggestions and warnings. Piedmont's time frame looked something like this: 1980 - joined Solinet (OCLC) 1982 - started OCLC retrospective conversion 1984 - purchased IBM-PC-AT, completed

retrospective conversion 1986 - on-line catalog, conversion of non-print, serials control and acquisitions 1987 - planning Tech. System Union Catalog 1988 -complete union catalog on CD ROM for all 16 Tech. colleges of S.C. 1989 - provide all resources on a common CD ROM. Koenig explained the networking of his hardware and discussed at length the various software packages he uses: Ocelot Library System (from LISI, who kindly provided mailing of handouts to the overflow crowd,) PFS Professional Write, Professional File and DBASE III among others. Koenig ended his presentation with cautionary notes about planning and interlibrary co-(continued next page)

SAN FRANCISCO PROGRAM (continued from page 2) operation: "Automation will not happen overnight...reduction in staff will not happen." "Interlibrary cooperation can keep costs down, expand capabilities, develop expertise and support, minimize mistakes and promote stronger programs."

This year, the Conference Planning Committee, Marilyn McDonald, Gladys Chaw, Mary Dolven, and Charlotte Thunen welcomed the early birds to their city by the bay with a Chinese banquet. The chance to meet new people, mingle and catch up with old friends gave the conference a great start. Harvey Varnet and Carol Jones shared their slides and experiences developing the library for the new Sultan Qabos University in Oman. The combination of wonderful Chinese food, beautiful slides of an exotic campus and the style and expertise of the presenters reminded everyone there why they became librarians - for the glamor. Harvey humorously punctured a lot of daydreams with one last note on foreign librarianship: the most common complaint in Oman? Just like home, the cost of the photocopies.

Tour of Foothills Community College

Eighty librarians boarded 2 buses (thoughtfully provided by UTLAS) to travel south to Foothills Community College where they spent the morning touring an exemplary facility and listening to some encouraging words for the California library scene. The keynote speech was by Lois Marriott of the State of California, discussing the \$8 million materials grant available to community colleges. Greg Atkins and Tobin Clarke continued the theme of support to community college programs. The meeting was newsworthy for in-state librarians and thought-provoking for out-of-state visitors.

SUMMARY OF MEETINGS SAN FRANCISCO 1987 Business Meeting

- * Election results announced: Shirley Lowman is Vice Chair/Chair Elect and Madison Mosley, Secretary
- * The draft "Library Services to the Academically Disadvantaged in the Public Community College" was accepted and sent back to committee for final style/editorial work.
- * Recommendation passed to encourage the New Orleans Program Planing Committee to schedule a dinner on the Friday of the conference. The dinner at this year's conference was very well received.
- * By-laws change: Article VII Section 1, the newsletter editor and the archivist/historian have been added to the Executive Committee in ex officio positions. Article XI Section 2 "A vacancy in the office of vic-chair/chair elect will be filled as follows: the Executive Committee will select by vote from candidates recommended by the Nominating Committee with voting done by mail or at conference, whichever is more timely."

1st Executive Committee Meeting

- * Charge to the Membership/Communications Committee to explore a nation-wide telephone network to assist in establishing contacts, in promoting communications, identifying expertise and in general, further the goals and objectives of the section.
- * Motion to explore publishing "Services to Academically Disadvantaged..." in AACJC Journal.
- * Announcement that section review is due September 1, 1988. All committee chairs charged to make notes and observations for draft review. Special meeting will be scheduled in San Antonio.
- * Discussion of ACRL Strategic Planning. Acceptance of both statements as proposed by ACRL.
- * Discussion of section committee structure. Each chair is charged to present a recommendation to the Executive Committee regarding the viability and future of individual committees.
- * Copies of FY 87/88 budget were distributed.

Planning & Procedures Committee Orientation

* As Cathleen Bourdon was unable to lead the orientation, the committee, section officers and guests conducted a lively discussion. Topics covered: make a concerted effort to use 1989 ACRL in Cincinnati as an opportunity to make CJCLS more visible. Explore possibility of a conference room-mate service. (See form on page 7) The conclusion of those present was that CJCLS can best serve as a vehicle for the exchange of ideas.
