



The Book Review Committee was made a standing committee of CJCLS last summer. It continues to evolve. Originally, we were going to include reviews of individual books in our newsletter, and Dale Luchsinger agreed to serve as book review editor. However, it was difficult to get publishers to provide free review copies. About the same time the editorial board of Choice (with strong support from our representative, Lee Hisle) agreed to drop non-print reviews, leaving space and financial resources available for reviews of more items of interest to community colleges. Choice staff also are interested in producing a new edition of Books for Community College Libraries, a core list of what a good two-year college/technical library should have. More about this as information becomes available.

New Technology in Community College LRCs Highlighted at ACRL's 6th National Conference in Salt Lake City April 12-14

The Community & Junior College Libraries Section of ACRL sponsored two presentations at the ACRL National Conference in Salt Lake City.

"Aggressive Teaching for Information Literacy in High-Tech Times" was presented by Dr. Rudy Widman, Director of Learning Resources and Jimmie Anne Nourse, Head of Library Services at Indian River Community College, Ft. Pierce, FL. Widman and Nourse received the 1991 ACRL Community and Junior College Learning Resources Achievement Award for Program Development for their outreach instructional program electronic access to on information. They offer it, not only to students, but to college instructors and other community librarians. They have co-authored and published articles several and а textbook, presented seminars, and participated in state conferences featuring this program. Nourse is the primary instructor in the program and has received local and staterecognition wide for her innovative programs and teaching ability.

"Project ACCESS: Toward a Curriculum-Based Collection in a Library Without Walls" was presented by **Richard Meerdink**, Librarian, Milwaukee Area Technical College. Project ACCESS is a three-year (10/89-9/92), \$300,000 research and development grant from the U.S. Department of Education's "College and Library Technology Cooperation Program." MATC was one of only thirteen colleges in the nation to receive such a grant and,

at the time, was the only twoyear college.

Under Project ACCESS. college instructors identify L.C. subject headings relevant to their disciplines, then run them against the library's database of holdings to get of available printouts curriculum-support materials. Funds have also permitted the library to purchase the following CD-ROM products: UMI ProQuest full-text periodicals database; Info Trac's Academic Index; ABI--INFORM; NTIS; and Newspaper Abstracts. They plan make these databases to available on the library's public catalog.

MATC's library has the license to two PBS channels. They are using a satellite dish on their radio station antennae to create a microwave link with the University of Wisconsin to access WiscNet (which includes the holdings of the University's library systems) and Internet.

In addition to these two programs sponsored by CJCLS, two other programs will highlight community college LRC professionals: "Diversity and Pluralism in Staffing: That Work" will Strategies feature Laurita Moore de Diaz, Rio Salado Community College, Maricopa District, Phoenix, AZ and "Accentuate the Positive, Eliminate the Negative: Don't Around with Mess Accreditation," will feature Gretchen Neill, DeKalb College, GA.
