

As a member of CJCLS you are in an elite group of over 1,000 community college librarians and learning resources employees who have made a commitment to their professional organization. Library Resources Review: Over 1,000 copies of Vocational and Technical Resources for Community Colleges have been sold. This group has held some valuable discussions on CJC-L. The committee is also looking into publication of a new edition and has support from the new editor of Choice for doing this.

Research and Publications: The committee has been working on the second of the CJCLS Guide series, The Copyright Sampler, compiled by Wanda Johnston and Derrie Roark, which, if it isn't out already, will be out soon. The committee encourages everyone to

contact them regarding new ideas for new publications. The first CJCLS Guide, Access Versus Ownership: Collection Management in the Electronic Age, is in its second printing.

Technology: This committee has been looking into developing a CJCLS Web Site. This would certainly promote CJCLS and strengthen the section as a whole. The Board recommended that the Technology Committee gather more information, look at steps needed to set up a web site, whether through ALA or at a college site, and bring a report or recommendation back to the Board. Mary Dolven, Chair, also reported that the collection of internet course syllabi, technology plans, and internet policies is continuing and some of these documents are now on the ftp site at DeKalb College.

Program Planning 1997: San Francisco! What a great place to plan a conference program for. Because the ACRL program has only recently been settled we do not have a firm program right now. We will do the regular Friday night dinner and a Monday tour of the new library at City College of San Francisco, courtesy of Rita Jones. CJCLS will be running a full slate of meetings at Midwinter in Washington, D.C., February 14-19, 1997. Committees will be meeting, as well as the CJCLS Board and Executive Committee. We also have a joint meeting scheduled for the National Council for Learning Resources. The CJCLS Awards Committee is eager to receive nominations for the Section's Awards for Leadership and Program Development. Each winner receives \$500 along with a plaque from EBSCO Subscription Services, which sponsors this recognition. Leadership Award

nominees must be members of CJCLS. The program development nominees need not be CJCLS members, and the nominee may be an individual, a group, a library, or some other part of an institution.

Leadership award nominees should demonstrate achievement in promoting learning resources/library programs or services locally or through professional organizations associated with the mission of community, junior, or technical college.

Program award nominees should demonstrate achievement in developing an innovative, significant learning resources/library program. This can be on a broad scale such as the state-wide level, but it can equally be a small, local project.

Both types of programs have received the award recently. In making nominations, don't be intimidated by the idea that this award is intended primarily for projects on a grand scale. This is not the case.

December 1 is the deadline for postmarking the nomination form and accompanying information. Susan Maltese will be glad to work with you and the nominee to be sure the necessary information is available by the deadline.



## ACRL Standards Study Taskforce Report from Gretchen Neill

This ACRL Taskforce was charged with developing a plan for looking at how accreditation agencies view libraries and in particular, now they use the ACRL Standards as part of their process. This report was to have been submitted to the Board at the 1996Annual Conference. The members of the Taskforce agreed that the current climate in which accreditation agencies operate is problematic; the current ACRL Standards do not address well many current instructional and library issues and concerns; and few accrediting agencies have begun to address these changes. Given these problems, it was felt that it would be unwise to suggest at this time that accreditation agencies make more explicit use of existing standards and recommend that: ACRL send a copy of the standards, once revised, to accreditation associations with a letter expressing hope that they be made available as a reference to evaluators; and, that ACRL consider sponsoring a forum on Accreditation Issues and Academic Libraries, the goal of which would be to identify and reach consensus of information technology and library developments which may be useful in development of new or revised accreditation standards.

In view of the content of this report and ACRL's recommendation that standards be revised every five years, the Board recommended that appointments to a committee to consider revisions to the standards be made as soon as possible.

- Collaborative learning initiatives and teaching projects
- Environmental design projects, either virtual or physical

Of course, proposals that describe projects in other areas are also welcome. The Showcase of Ideas will consist of informal presentations that can take the shape of poster sessions or demonstrated papers. Librarians presenting demonstrated papers should be prepared to repeat the presentation several times. Each presentation should last about ten minutes, including time for questions. We believe that these interactive sessions will be a spectacular conclusion to the President's Program.

To submit a proposal, send a 250 word abstract with your name, address, phone number and e-mail address by December 31, 1996. (Please indicate if you will need access to electricity). Proposals will be accepted by mail, e-mail, or fax. The review panel will consist of representatives from each of the sponsoring sections.

The committee is looking forward to broad representation from the sections of ACRL.


