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From The Chair:

Having been active in CJCLS for about 14 years now, I have watched it ebb and grow, and right now, I believe we are in a growth period! Membership is up, and I am happy to report that attendance at the CJCLS committee meetings was markedly increased. We went through a couple of years where the number of committee members actually attending the meetings dropped off significantly. This was blamed on lack of travel money for many. I hope the increased attendance means more of you can obtain travel money again. One thing that excites me is the number of new people volunteering for committees. To thrive, all organizations need a constant replenishment of new blood. One could say that CJCLS has received a giant transfusion this year. We are, of course, still very fortunate to have many long time members still active in the section who are helping to orient all these newly active members.

Let me fill you in on some of the major accomplishments of some of these long time members. We have had some really strong leadership over most of these past ten years, and members have done a lot to make community college librarians more visible and recognized for the innovative and creative things they do. We have successfully nominated and gotten members elected to the ACRL Board for most of the last ten years, if not all. In 1990, the first EBSCO Community College Learning Resources Achievement Awards were awarded; one for leadership and another for innovative program development. Some hardworking individuals worked with EBSCO Subscription Services to win their generous support of this award.

In 1992, NCLR (National Council for Learning Resources) was founded by very active CJCLS members. This organization was formed to help community college librarians have a voice with their Presidents or Chancellors and other top administrators at their premier association conference, which is AACC (American Association of Community Colleges). It is an affiliate of AACC and presents programs and publishes a newsletter expressly for top administrators. In 1994/95 our section leaders started the Community and Junior College Librarians Listserv. It is open to all community college librarians and other interested individuals regardless of their affiliation with CJCLS.

In 1995 the first CJCLS Guide was published, Access Versus Ownership: Collection Management in the Electronic Age. A second Guide on Copyright was published in 1997, and we plan to publish more guides in the future. Possibly the greatest of our achievements was to have two very accomplished community college librarians run for President of ACRL. Lee Hisle, a former chair of CJCLS, was elected President of ACRL and he has just finished serving this year, 1998, as President. His competent administration has reflected well on CJCLS and can only encourage ACRL leaders to look to our section for more participation and leadership in the future.

Participating in CJCLS can foster activities that help us keep our learning resource centers vibrant and effective institutions. To keep us on target, CJCLS is in the process of revising its Bylaws, which includes examining our organization to make sure it is still strategically placed and pointed in the right direction to ensure that we can provide more and better innovative programs and services for community college librarians. This is the perfect time where your expertise, interest and willingness to work can make a real difference in the future direction of the organization. CJCLS Executive board and committee members continually strive to have an exemplary organization for the benefit of its members.

For those of you who are already active, I sincerely thank you for your hard work. For those of you who want to become an active member of the CJCLS team or just want to tell us what we can do to better serve your needs, then get in touch with us. Join our Listserv to hear from and communicate with other community college librarians, or contact me directly. I look forward to hearing from you, and seeing many of you at Midwinter in Philadelphia.

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CJCLS Membership Survey Results Summary

During my year as CJCLS Chair, I focused on membership and planning. CJCLS is a vital organization which provides many professional opportunities. The Board and I wanted to ensure this vitality. While we decided to not develop a formal strategic per the ACRL format, we instead sought input from you, the entire CJCLS membership, to help us better know our 1164 members and which current membership services are most valued as well as which future activities are desired.

To obtain this information, we included a membership survey in the Spring 1998 newsletter. Unfortunately, response was low. Only 29 members, 2% of our membership, responded. Of these respondents, half represented single campus and half multi-campus districts. 75% represented learning resources departments with less than ten full-time equivalent staff. Half performed administrative responsibilities while 75% provided reference, collection development, and library instruction services.

When asked which CJCLS activities they used most, 62% cited the CJC-L Listserv and the CJCLS Newsletter. Fewer respondents noted participation in CJCLS conference programs, networking at the Friday evening dinner socials, and committee participation. The most appreciated were the CJCLS membership benefits of networking, listserv discussions, information about community college libraries, and generally keeping in touch with colleagues.

Suggestions for the future addressed annual programs, Newsletter articles, CJCLS Guide Series topics, and creation of a CJCLS Website. Continuing the "fun get-togethers" and continuing education programs on nonbook resources, combining the library/LRC with computing, and working with other College divisions were suggested for annual programs.

Desired newsletter columns or articles included practical idea sharing, spotlighting specific libraries, discussing specific library issues and services. Ideas for the CJCLS Guide series included Internet issues, distance learning, library instruction, library/LRC organization and staffing, and visioning.

Nearly every respondent sought a CJCLS Website. In addition to basic membership information, important dates, and the newsletter, respondents suggested inclusion of committee pages, opportunities to publish, library standards, white papers, contact lists, and statistics.

These survey results and other input will guide the Board and Committees as we plan our activities toward the future. We appreciate the suggestions from the survey respondents and welcome other ideas and suggestions to ensure CJCLS retains is vitality. We also encourage you to take an active role with CJCLS. ACRL reimburses direct costs incurred for conducting the survey and compiling the data into camera ready copy. The editor contributes approximately 110 hours of creative and production time. The entire profession benefits from the project.
