EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

Chicago, Illinois. April 2, 1921

A meeting of the Executive Board was held in The John Crerar Library, Chicago, Illinois, April 2, 1921.

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Let, 1920, were presented.

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Present: Miss Tyler, President, Misses Eastman and Tobitt, Messrs. Meyer, Strohm, Utley and Root; also Mr.Milam, Secretary, Miss Bogle, Assistant Secretary, and Mr. Tweedell, Treasurer, part of the time.

Minutes: The Minutes of the meetings held December 18th and 28th, 1920, were approved.

Secretary's Report: The Secretary read a report of the work of the A.L.A. Headquarters since the December 28th meeting.

Correspondence Votes: The Secretary reported that the following Supplementary War Funds Budget had been approved by the Executive Board by correspondence vote:

RESOLVED: That the recommendations contained in the resolutions of the Committee of Eleven now submitted, are hereby adopted on behalf of the American Library Association and, so far as this organization is concerned, the Committee of Eleven and United War Work Campaign, Inc., are relieved of obligation to enforce payment of the subscriptions referred to in said resolutions, and their action in accordance with said resolutions is ratified and confirmed, and this organization will hold them harmless in such action so far as it affects this organization.

The recommendations referred to in the vote just quoted are attached to these minutes as Exhibit A.

American Legion Correspondence: Letters from the National Commander, F. W. Galbraith, Jr., and from de Lancey Kountze, both dated March 28th, inviting the A.L.A. to attend a conference called by the American Legion for April 4th, were read by the Secretary. The President, with the approval of the Board, appointed Mr. Meyer to represent the Association at that meeting.

War Fund Annual Report: The Treasurer's report of receipts and expenditures of War Funds from January 1st to December 31st, 1920, was presented.

VOTED: That the Treasurer's report on War Funds for the calendar year of 1920, be approved, with the understanding that Note 2 be amplified. (This report is attached to these minutes as Exhibit B.J.

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War Funds Report 1917-1920:

<u>VOTED</u>: That the general financial report of War Funds 1917-1920 now being prepared by certified public accountants, be printed in the Bulletin.

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War Funds Supplementary Budget:

<u>VOTED</u>: That we contribute from the War Funds to the American Library in Paris, Inc., a sum of \$25,000 as an endowment fund, the income to be used in paying in part the salary in that Library of an American trained in an American Library School. This gift is made subject to the condition that the selection of such an assistant shall be approved by the Executive Board of the American Library Association. The exact form of the bequest is subject to legal formalities and to the approval of the Board of Directors of the American Library in Faris, Inc.

VOTED: That the \$6000.00 item for the Navy be reduced to \$3000.00.

VOTED: That the Secretary be instructed to write Mrs. Henry Howard, stating that the Executive Board is interested in the progress of the American Merchant Marine Library Association, and asking for a statement concerning the financial status and prospects of the new organization.

<u>VOTED</u>: That the Supplementary Budget for War Funds be adopted as modified.

Transfer of War Funds: The Secretary reported that a balance of \$579.87 is still held by the American Security & Trust Company to the credit of the American Library Association War Service Fund: that it was left there to cover certain checks which had never been presented for payment.

VOTED: That the American Security & Trust Company is authorized and directed to transfer the entire balance in the account of the American Library Association War Service Fund to the Chicago Trust Company, Chicago, Illinois, for the account of the American Library Association War Funds, E. D. Tweedell, Treasurer.

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It was understood that the American Security & Trust Company is to be asked to forward to the Chicago Trust Company for payment, any of these old checks which may hereafter be presented.

War Funds Investment: The Treasurer reported that, with the approval of the chairman of the Finance Committee, he had invested \$25,000 of War Funds in a U. S. Certificate of Indebtedness, payable the 15th of September. He stated that the interest at 5½% would amount to approximately \$560.00 more than the interest which would have been received from the bank. The Board by a formal vote approved the action of the Treasurer.

Financial Report, Enlarged Program and Books for Everybody Fund: The Secretary brought the detailed statements to the attention of the Executive Board, stating that the formal report had been approved in December.

VOTED: That a summary of these reports be printed, the items to be included to be left to the decision of the chairman of the Finance Committee and the Treasurer, with a note stating that the details of the report are available at A.L.A. headquarters.

VOTED: That the statement showing the loan from the War Service Funds to the Enlarged Programs and the manner of its repayment, be printed in the A.L.A. Bulletin, and also sent to Library periodicals, with a note appended explaining that after all expenses of the campaign were paid, a balance of \$1,626.97 was transferred to the Books for Everybody Fund, making the net amount paid from the Books for Everybody Fund, \$13,447.34 instead of \$15,074.31. (Copy is attached as Exhibit C.)

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Books for Everybody Budget: The chairman of the Finance Committee presented a reports on the status of Books for Everybody Fund.

VOTED: That in compliance with the vote of the Executive Board of April 30, 1920, approved by the Association June 5, 1920, the Treasurer be authorized and directed to pay to the trustees of the endowment fund as part of the permanent endowment, the sum of \$20,447.21, this being 50% of the cash received up to March 1st for Books for Everybody Fund.

VOTED: That the Board adopt the report of the Finance Committee to the Executive Board under date of March 25th, embodying the budget of the Books for Everybody Fund.

The entire report, including the budget, is attached to these minutes as Exhibit D.

<u>VOTED</u>: That the Secretary be authorized to employ such persons as are needed in carrying out the provisions of the Books for Everybody Budget, and to arrange for such transfers as are required.

Appropriation for Employment Service:

VOTED: That the sum of \$900.00 be appropriated out of the contingent fund, or other available funds, for the Employment Service at headquarters.

Refund -- Books for Everybody Fund:

VOTED: That the Treasurer be authorized and directed, from the Books for Everybody Fund, to refund \$150.00 of the contribution received from LaSalle Extension University, and \$1,254.31 of the amount received from the Canton War Chest Committee.

This vote was in accordance with the letters received from LaSalle Extension University March 1, 1921, and G. E. Lundy of Canton, Ohio, March 26th.

Audits:

VOTED: That in the future the audits by certified public accountants be made once a year conforming to the calendar and fiscal year.

Distribution -- Fifty Copies Les Livres a la Guerre:

VOTED: That the distribution of Mr. Koch's book be left to the Secretary.

Trustee for Paris Library: On the recommendation of C. Carlton, Mr. Lawrence V. Benet was elected as a member W. N. of the Board of Directors of the American Library in Paris, Inc.

St. Louis Resolution: The following communication from Dr. Bostwick was read:

"At a meeting of 54 members of the A.L.A. residing in St. Louis and its vicinity, held in St. Louis on February 2, 1921, the following was unanimously adopted: 'RESOLVED: That the Executive Board of the American Library Association be informed of the present meeting of 54 members of the Association living in and near St. Louis, and of the intention of the participants to hold similar meetings in the future; that the Board be asked to give its formal sanction to such meetings and to advise how they may best be held. '

Also a letter of April 1st from Dr. Bostwick to Miss Tyler.

VOTED: That the organization of members of the A.L.A. in cities or general localities meets with the sympathy of the Executive Board but in view of the fact that this has been made part of the pro-posed constitution the Executive Board feels that it can take no action at this time.

War Service Badge: A communication of March 9th from Joseph F. Daniels of Riverside, Cal., suggesting that a button or pin be given to those who worked in the War Service, was read to the Board. The Secretary was instructed to reply to Mr. Daniels, stating that practically all librarians had done important work in the Library War Service cause, some in the field and many more at home, and that it would be impossible to decide who was entitled to the button.

War Service Books at Jacksonville, Tenn.: The transfer of approximately 2000 volumes, (provided by the A.L.A. War Ser-vice for the Y.M.C.A. at the Old Hickory Powder Plant, to the Old Hickory Women's Club,) was authorized.

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American Country Life Association: A communication of February 1st, from the American Country Life Association, was read to the Board.

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VOTED: That the Secretary take the necessary steps to bring about the affiliation of the A.L.A. with the Council of National Agencies engaged in rural social work.

North Dakota Farm: The Secretary read various communications from C. D. Kauffman and others about his proposal to deed a farm to the A.L.A. for endowment of Books for the Blind work. The letter was received and filed.

March 30th from Mr. Cill was read to the Board.

VOTED: That the Secretary be instructed to inform Mr. Gill of the progress in the organization of the American Merchant Marine Library Association, and of the Executive Board's desire to have the books in question turned over to the new organization for use at the appropriate time.

<u>Work:</u> The President asked Vice-President Meyer to represent the Association in the Conference on Co-ordination of National Social Work to be held in the New Willard Hotel, Washington, D. C., on April 14th.

Reciprocal Relations with other Associations: After reading the letter of April 1st from Miss Ahern, asking for a statement as to the duties of the Committee on Reciprocal Relations the Executive Board

VOTED: That the Secretary and President be instructed to communicate with Miss Ahern, requesting that the Committee recommend to the Executive Board, and perhaps to the Council, a general policy with respect to the A.L.A.'s relations with other national organizations, and that the Committee also recommend to the Executive Board specific things which the Association should do in the way of sending exhibits, delegates or speakers to national meetings.

Delegates to American Academy of Political and Social Science. The President, with the approval of the Board, appointed the following persons to represent the A.L.A. at the annual meeting of the Academy in Philadelphia, May 13 and 14: Arthur L. Bailey, John Ashhurst, and Asa Don Dickinson.

National Book Day:

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VOTED: That the Executive Board of the American Library Association endorse the idea of a National Book Day, having for its object the return of books that are not the property of the possessor, and that the Secretary inform the various newspaper syndicates of the action of the Board.

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- VOTED: That the thanks of the Executive Board be extended and appreciation recorded for the courtesy and hospitality shown by Doctor Andrews, Mr. Tweedell and the Board of Directors of the John Crerar Library.
- 2: That a portion of the Treasurer's traveling expenses to Swampscott, not to exceed \$100.00, be paid out of the War Funds. VOTED:

WHEREAS, of the total subscription of about \$202.000,000 to the United War Campaign Fund of November 1918, upwards of \$188,000,000 have been collected by UNITED WAR WORK CAMPAIGN, INC., and upwards of \$185,000,000 (including \$3,000,000 just now ordered) have been distributed by it to the seven cooperating societies in accordance with the memoranda of agreement between the seven societies adopted September 4, 1918, and December 24, 1918, and the purposes for which the said Fund was raised are approaching completion; and

WHEREAS, in view of these conditions and of the time elapsed since the Armistice, there is increasing difficulty in collecting subscriptions to the United War Campaign Fund, especially in cases where the subscriptions were made by organizations representing communities, generally known as War Chests or Community Chests; and

WHEREAS, in the cases of the subscriptions made by the War Chests and other organizations enumerated below, the Committee had made diligent effort to effect collection thereof but the said organizations severally have refused and still refuse to pay their respective subscriptions (or some part thereof) and announce that their refusal is permanent, upon the asserted ground that under present conditions and at the present distance of time from the Armistice no need exists for such payment, and it is understood that they have severally indicated a desire to pay the amounts of their several subscriptions respectively (or some part thereof) to Funds instituted for the relief of populations, especially children, suffering and in danger of famine as an out-come of the great War, in connection with which the United War Campaign Fund was raised, and they have indicated their judgment that the purposes of these Relief Funds, as just stated, are in a broad and general sense reasonably related to the purpose for which the United War Campaign Fund was more immediately raised; now, in view of all the foregoing, it is PART P

RESOLVED as follows:

(1) That the seven cooperating societies are hereby recommended not to object to the payment by the several local organizations above referred to of their several unpaid subscriptions above mentioned (or such parts thereof as the local organizations shall severally and respectively determine) to such Relief Funds as are above mentioned in lieu of payment to the United War Campaign Fund, and to hold harmless United War Tork Campaign, Inc. and the Committee of Eleven in not enforcing payment to them of such subscriptions;

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- (1) On March 8th, the title of the War Service Funds in American Security & Trust Company, Washington, D.C., was changed to Executive Board Funds. In October the balance was transferred to Chicago Trust Company and called War Funds.
- (2) The Executive Board on July 15th, 1920, voted that the balance available from First War Service Fund amounting to \$84,925.69 be used to repay the loan made by the War Service Fund to the Enlarged Program, leaving a balance due of \$20,074.31 on December 31st, 1920. This balance was paid in January, 1921. See the "Statement showing loan from the War Service Funds to the Enlarged Program and the manner of its repayment," Exhibit C.
- (3) This represents the loss from March 1918 to May 1, 1920, caused by a shrinkage in exchange on the amount sent to Paris for a contigent fund.
- (4) Auditor shows \$19.49 more in this amount which is for interestcredited by bank Dec. 31, 1920, and not entered on books.

The amount of cash available (Nov. 1) is 39,857.20 From this should be set aside as an endowment fund, one-half of \$40,894.42, namely <u>20,447.21</u>

Leaving a balance available for appropriation of \$19,409.99

The cash contributions for special purposes amount to \$12,095.55, less \$1,037.20 already spent for books for the blind; net \$11,058.35.

It seems desirable to spend first the donations for special purposes in order that those purposes which were in the minds of the donors may be accomplished as soon as possible. It is desirable also to reserve some of the general funds for further addition to the endowment fund when the pledges (which are chiefly for special purposes) have been paid. (The Committee recommends that, if possible, only funds given for general purposes be put into the endowment fund.) Exhibit D.

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Although it makes the foregoing suggestions for the expenditure of this amount, 12,057.75, it feels that the Executive Board should have a free hand to make such appropriation of it as it deems proper, and feel under no obligation to adopt this suggested schedule of expenditures.

WITNESSETH : -

That whereas a gift of \$25,000 (Twenty-five thousand dollars) has been duly authorized by the Executive Board of the Party of the First Part, and its acceptance duly authorized by the Board of Directors of the Party of the Second Part for the purpose and subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned:

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and mutual promises and covenants herein contained, the parties have agreed as follows:-

The Party of the First Part does hereby agree to transfer and pay over immediately upon the ensealing of these presents to the Party of the Second Part, or to its account in any bank which it may designate in the City of Paris, Republic of France, the sum of \$25,000 dollars (Twenty-five thousand dollars) which shall be and belong to the said Party of the Second /Part, or its Exhibit E

For the purpose of paying the salary, in whole or in part, of an American library assistant who shall have been trained in an American library school, and whose selection shall, in each and every case be approved by the Executive Board of the American Library Association as a person properly trained and capable of training library assistants, of French or other nationality, in the methods of organizing, directing, and administering public libraries according to the methods prevailing in the United States of America, and particularly in the libraries under the direction of the American Library Association.

Replying to your letter of May 21st concerning the printing of papers in the proceedings for the Swampscott meeting. The need to reduce the amount of printing to the very lowest terms is both evident and urgent.

Taking up your suggestions in order, I would recommend:

1. That we leave out of the proceedings all the papers and addresses mich will have been printed in some one of thelibrary periodicals before the proceedings go to press.

2. That we summarize all papers which will permit of such treatment. to not think that any rule can be laid down. Some writers condense so that meir papers are summaries, others are so diffuse that 90% of the words could be left out, very much to the advantage of the information contained in the paper.

3. That the material already printed in the Bulletin be omitted.

4. That the Committees reduce their reports to the fewest possible words, motice to this effect should go out immediately.

As a foot-note to this recommendation, I would add that the Report of the Committee on documents need not be printed in the proceedings at all, If our plans at the Round Table work out I hope to bring out of the meeting material that will be worth printing as a leaflet or handbook on the circulation of documents in a public library.

5. That the reports of the proceedings of the General sessions and the Council be very strictly edited and only matter of importance printed.

6. The same principle would apply to the reports of the proceedings of sections.

. That a limit be placed on the space allowed in the proceedings to ifiliated societies, with the understanding that more pages will be vailable if they are willing to pay for the printing.

. That the edition be but little smaller than usual. The suggestion hat you make raises an ethical question. Every member is entitled to a copy free. I think it would be perfectly fair to say that this year the Proceedings will be sent out only to institutional members, and to others the ask for it. The asking should not be restricted to a reply to any. circular letter, a request from anyone who is a member this year, coming ' it any time what-so-ever should be honored. I do not think very much is saved in limiting the size of the edition; the chief cost is in the composition. Further there has been a considerable addition to the number of members this year which in itself would mean an increased demand for the proceedings.

I should oppose any diminution in the size of the edition of the Handbook, nor should the information which it contains be curtailed in anyway. This is too valuable a desk-tool to have its usefulness impaired by omissions.

Memorandum To the Executive Board, American Library Association:

During the past four years I have devoted all my leisure moments, and as much time and energy as I could spare from my official duties, to the writing of pamphlets and books on Library War Service. This has been done without any appropriation from War Service Funds for clerical help, typewriting, and travel (save for two interviews). The expense of preparing six editions of two pamphlets and the three volumes, "War Libraries and Allied Studies," "Books in the War," and "Les Livres á la Guerre" has been very considerable, especially in the items of preparation of copy, illustrations, and necessary travel to the different places where they were printed:

It is now clear that "Books in the War" will not pay for itself. No royalty was to be paid me until after the publishers recovered the full amount that they put into the book, \$3345.28, and they are still about five hundred dollars short of this amount. The author's rights in the French edition consisted simply of twenty-five unbound copies. It is clear, therefore, that I cannot expect, either from Houghton Mifflin Company or from Edouard Champion, any reimbursement for the money I put into the preparation of the editions they published.

The chief items of expense entailed by me were the following:

In addition to the above, there was the very large expense of a special trip to Paris and Abbeville, in northern France, where the book was printed, including a ten weeks stay over there while reading the proof, arranging the lay-out of illustrations, making the index, seeing the French edition through the press, and arranging for distribution of copies for publicity purpose.

It was the general feeling among the workers of several years ago that a literary history of Library War Service, issued over the imprint of a well-known publishing house, would achieve a kind of publicity which could not be secured through official reports published by the Association itself. While being more than willing to try my hand at the writing of such a history, I did not feel warranted in asking for much help as there were those who thought that incidental expenses should come out of the proceeds of the sales of the book. But, as shown above, the publishers themselves have not recovered the costs of the last two editions, and consequently, there were no royalties from which these expenses could be met.

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I therefore venture to ask, whether in the opinion of the Executive Board, a grant from the balance in the War Service fund could not properly be made to cover some of the expenses incurred by me in the preparation of these books.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

Hotel Sherman Chicag9, Illinois December 28, 1921

A meeting of the Executive Board was held in Hotel Sherman, Chicago, Illinois, Wednesday, December 28, 1921, at 2:30 p.m.

<u>Present</u>: President Root, Mr. Ranck, Misses Barnett, Countryman, and Mann, Messrs. Meyer, Roden, Tweedell and Utley; also Mr. Milam, Secretary, and Miss Bogle, Assistant Secretary.

Minutes: The minutes of the meetings held June 22 and June 26, 1921, were approved.

<u>Correspondence Votes</u>: The Secretary read the following reports of correspondence votes: (The dates given are those of the Secretary's letters to the Executive Board requesting the vote.)

A.L.A. Representative to British Meeting: The Executive Board, by correspondence vote July 13, 1921, approved the appointment of W. W. Bishop of Ann Arbor, Michigan, as delegate from the American Library Association to the meeting of The Library Association in Manchester, commencing September 12, 1921.

Tariff Bill: The Executive Board, by correspondence vote August 19, 1921, approved the statement on the Fordney Tariff Bill, which is attached to these minutes as Exhibit "A".

American Library in Paris, Inc.: The Executive Board by correspondence vote August 23, 1921,

VOTED: That W. Dawson Johnston of St. Paul be recommended as librarian to the Board of Trustees of the American Library in Paris, for one or two years, at a salary of \$4,000 per year, plus traveling expenses from New York to Paris and return; and that \$1,000 of this annual salary be paid from A.L.A. War Funds for his term of service, but not for more than two years.

Merchant Marine: The Executive Board, by correspondence vote August 23, 1921,

VOTED: That the books and equipment which are

being held for Merchant Marine Library Service and our responsibility for the Merchant Marine Library Service be transferred by the Secretary of the A.L.A. to the American Merchant Marine Library Asso-ciation through its President, Mrs. Henry Howard of Cleveland.

VOTED: That \$5,000 be appropriated from War Funds to the American Merchant Marine Library Association, to be used at the discretion of that Association for library service to American Merchant vessels: the money to be transferred by the Treasurer of the A.L.A. to the Treasurer of the American Merchant Marine Library Association.

Nominating Committee: The Executive Board, by correspondence vote August 23,1921, approved the appointment of the following as a Nominating Committee:

> Arthur E. Bostwick, chairman June R. Donnelly Linda A. Eastman-M. J. Ferguson Caroline M. Underhill

June R. Donnelly and Caroline M. Underhill declined the appointment and on October 3, 1921, the Executive Board approved the following:

That the following persons be appointed on the Nominating Committee to take the place of June R. Donnelly and Caroline Underhill, who have declined appointment: Caroline M. Hewins and Theresa Hitchler.

That President Root be authorized to fill any further vacancies which may occur in the Nominating Committee without further reference to the Executive Board.

Caroline M. Hewins and Theresa Hitchler declined to serve and President Root appointed Edward F. Stevens and Edna M. Sanderson to fill the vacancies. Mr. Stevens and Miss Sanderson both accepted and therefore the Nominating Committee consists of the following:

> Arthur E. Bostwick, chairman Linda A. Eastman M. J. Ferguson Edna M. Sanderson Edward F. Stevens

Membership Dues: The Executive Board by correspondence vote August 23, 1921,

VOTED: That after 1921 the annual dues of members receiving the Handbook and Pro-ceedings shall be four dollars.

VOTED: That after 1921 The Booklist be not sent to institutional members unless they subscribe for it in the usual way.

Transfers in Budget: The Executive Board, by correspondence vote on October 8, 1921, approved the transfers in the General Funds budget as follows:

\$ 23.35 from Salaries to Conference 150.00 from Salaries to Supplies \$200.00 from Salaries to Miscellaneous

Trustees of the American Library in Paris, Inc.: The Executive Board, by correspondence vote on November 1, 1921, appointed the following as trustees of the American Library in Paris, Inc., for one year from November 8, 1921:

> Charles Louis Seeger Charles Cestre Laurence V. Benet Walter V. R. Berry W. C. Huntington

Life Members: Informal discussion indicated a desire to have the Secretary report in the A.L.A. Bulletin as news the fact that some of the old life members nave voluntarily paid an addibional \$25.00 to the Association in order that their contribution may be the same as that of life members who join now at the \$50.00 rate.

<u>Transfer of Library War Service Activities</u>: Mr. Meyer reported for this committee that the library service for hospitals is still in an unsettled condition; that the government is gradually assuming responsibility for the library work in the Public Health Service Hospitals; but that the Association, from its War Funds should continue to provide books and periodicals in cases where the government does not function or does not function promptly. On recommendation of Mr. Meyer

it was

VOTED: That A.L.A. Headquarters be authorized to employ at the expense of War Funds an assistant to have charge of the purchase of books and a clerical assistant

and it was

VOTED: That \$10,000 be appropriated from the War Funds to cover the cost of books and periodicals used in the service for the men not in Public Health Service Hospitals.

Books for Coblenz:

VOTED: That the Secretary be instructed to extend to Franklin K. Hopper the thanks of the Board for his service in purchasing and forwarding the \$1,000 worth of books for the Coblenz library service.

<u>War Service Files</u>: The preservation of these files was discussed. No action was taken but it was understood that none of the files now held in Washington and Chicago are to be disposed of.

Children's Department in Paris Library: The following resolution transmitted to the Executive Board on June 24, 1921, by the Secretary of the Children's Section of the American Library Association, was discussed:

> The Children's Section requests that the American Library Association provide, if possible, from its War Service Fund several thousand dollars to establish a Children's Room in the Paris Library. Communications from Dr. Carlton, Miss Annie Carroll Moore, Mr. Seeger and others were brought to the attention of the Executive Board.

Mr. Meyer and Mr. Utley were asked to draw up a resolution expressing the regret of the Executive Board that no funds are available which can be devoted to this work. (As Mr. Meyer and Mr. Utley were not called upon to report their resolution at a later meeting it will be submitted to the Executive Board for correspondence vote.)

A.L.A. Representative in Europe:

VOTED: That it is the sense of the Executive Board that in order to continue the practice and understanding of the previous administrations of the American Library in Paris, Inc., Dr. Johnston be instructed to act as the A.L.A. representative in Europe. (On the supposition that this is entirely agreeable to the Trustees of the American Library in Paris.)

Hospital Committee: A letter of December 20, 1921, from Miss Miriam E. Carey asking that a Committee on Hospital Libraries be appointed was referred to the Committee on Committees.

Length of Committee Reports: The question of restricting ne length of committee reports was referred to the Secretary.

<u>Municipal Obligation to Donors</u>: The letter of December 22, 1921, from Miss Anna A. MacDonald was brought to the attention of the Executive Board and the Secretary was instructed to ask that the committee present more specific recommendations.

National Council of Agencies Engaged in Rural Social Work: Letters of October 7, 1921, from Mr. R. G. Fuller and November 17, 1921, from Mr. E. C. Lindeman were brought to the attention of the Executive Board.

> VOTED: That the A.L.A. contribute the sum of \$50.00 from the Books for Everybody Fund for the work of the National Council of Agencies engaged in Rural Social Work.

Certification: A letter of November 12, 1921, stating that the New York Library Club had approved the plan of certification set forth by the A.L.A. Committee on National Certification was read to the Board:

National Association of Book Publishers: The Secretary was authorized to represent the A.L.A. at the annual meeting of the National Association of Book Publishers in New York City on Jamary 17, 1922.

Contributing and Sustaining Members:

VOTED: That the President and Secretary be authorized in the name of the Executive Board to extend invitations to individuals, organizations and institutions to join the American Library Association as contributing or sustaining members.

The Next Conference: Communications from various cities inviting the American Library Association to hold the next annual conference in those cities were read, and

it was

VOTED: That the next annual conference of the American Library Association be held at Detroit, Michigan, provided adequate hotel accommodations can be assured, and that the dates for the conference shall be fixed by the President and Secretary after a conference with the local committee.

The meeting adjourned.

Publications Assistant: On the recommendation of the Secretary and the Editor of The Booklist the Board authorized the employment of a publications assistant at approximately \$200.00 a month for such time as may be necessary to push to completion the editorial work on the A.L.A. Catalog Supplement, to compile the list of books for high school libraries, to do the final editorial work on a graded list of books for schools, etc., under the supervision of the Editor of The Booklist - the assistant to be paid from the funds set aside in the budget for publications.

Committees' Responsibility: The authority of committees to represent the Association when not specifically instructed was discussed as the result of questions asked by some committee chairmen and

it was

VOTED: That the Secretary be instructed to inform the chairmen of committees who are in doubt as to what action they ought to take when confronted by a change of situation, that they should refer matters in question back to the President to be laid before the Executive Board for advice before taking action.

Dates for Committee Reports:

VOTED: That the Secretary be instructed to inform all committees that their annual reports should be submitted on or before May 1, 1922, so that copies can be mailed to members of the Council one month before the session of the Council at the annual meeting.

Committee on Salaries:

VOTED: That the President be authorized to appoint a committee to continue the investigation of the salary question, the committee to report to the Executive Board.

Certification Committee: The Secretary stated that the Chairman of the Committee was unwilling to continue to serve as chairman and the President was authorized to fill the vacancy.

Statement as to Tariff on Books in the Fordney Bill.

1214

1. The tariff bill as passed by the House of Representatives continues the duty on books in the present law (increased to 20% from 15%) on recent books in the English language. It also removes from the free list, books in languages other than English, and books printed more than twenty years in English. The effect is to impose a duty of 20% on <u>all</u> books (with minor exceptions) of foreign origin, regardless of the language in which they are printed.

This is a serious blow to American scholarship. Foreign books are imported chiefly for the use of university and college professors and instructors, a salaried class whose purchasing power is admittedly much-lower than in earlier years, and who will be hampered and stopped in much of their work, if the bill becomes a law. The duty will be a serious tax upon knowledge. But a very small amount of revenue will accrue to the Treasury from this duty, a sum altogether out of proportion to the inconvenience and positive loss which the duty will cause. There seems no good reason for eliminating books from the free list in Par. 1529 of the House Bill. We, therefore, respectfully urge that the provisions of the Act of 1913 (Par. 425) i.e. "Books, maps, music, engravings, photographs, etchings, lithographic prints, bound or unbound, and charts, which shall have been printed more than twenty years at the date of importation" be restored to the bill (Par. 1529).

2. As a further argument in favor of restoring books in foreign languages to the free list, we beg to call attention to the undoubted fact that the present duty of 15% on recent English books has , operated (with increased costs of transportation) to raise the price of such books to the American buyer to a figure greatly in excess of the price in England, in some cases to more than double that price. Unquestionably the same cause will tend to operate in a like way in the case of books in foreign languages. 3. Libraries are now permitted to import two copies of a book (otherwise dutiable) in any one invoice - the Fordney bill restricts this privilege of free importation to two copies <u>as a maximum</u>, thus requiring large libraries to pay duty on all copies imported in ex-

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cess of two. This seems an unnecessary hardship. There is no indication that the privilege has been abused. It has sayed taxpayers of our cities much money.

4. Affidavits will be required of every library for every book imported, if foreign (i.e. non-English) books are taken from the freelist. This means an enormous amount of clerical work added to the already neavy burden of library administration. We have been freed from this burden for eight years, and shrink from the thought of going back to it. While seemingly a minor detail, it is in reality a very serious addition to the routine work of libraries.

The Executive Board of the American Library Association therefore respectfully but emphatically protests against reimposing a tax on knowledge in the shape of a duty on foreign language books. It earnestly urges the retention of the provisions of the present law (Par. 425) and confidently expects that the statement of the case is a sufficient argument. If, however, the Senate Committee in Finance desires to hear arguments in favor of this contention, the Association will be glad to appear by special representatives.

(1) The assumption is that we can get enough new members to balance off the losses of old members. (There was a net gain this year of 800); and that 3,000 members out of approximately 5,250 will accept the \$4.00 basis. But we should protect ourselves on this estimate by keeping a large contingent fund in the budget. No estimate is made of the possible income from contributing and sustaining members, although undoubtedly some such members can be secured.

(2) The amount paid from the Publishing Runds to the General Funds for editorial, selling, mailing and bookkeeping expenses on publications has averaged about 20% of the amount received from the sale of publications - up to 1921. The 635 free Booklist subscriptions furnished to institutional members make an additional payment of more than 6% of the sales of publications.

It is now proposed that the payment be 25% of the anount received from the sale of publications, thus providing a varying amount for a service which varies with the number of publications issued and sold.

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
