

Archimedes Text Sold for \$2 Million



A scorched and moldy volume of thousand-year-old pages — the oldest surviving copy of important mathematical works of Archimedes — was sold at auction yesterday for \$2 million, double the expected price.

The winning bid, at Christie's of New York City, was made by Simon Pinch, a London book dealer, who said he had acted on behalf of an unidentified private American collector. The seller was identified only as a French family that acquired the volume in the early 1920's.

The volume includes copies of two of Archimedes' greatest works: "Method of Mechanical Theorems," which includes ideas startlingly reminiscent of modern calculus, and "On Floating Bodies," which puts forth his laws of flotation.

They are in palimpsest form: that is, the original inked copy of Archimedes' texts, written by a 10th-century scribe, was washed off by Byzantine monks in the 13th century so that the expensive vellum on which it was written could be reused. The Archimedes text was made almost illegible by the washing and then covered by the later religious text.




Ownership of the Archimedes manuscript is being contested, by the Greek Orthodox Patriarch of Jerusalem on grounds that it was stolen.




But Felix de Maraz Oyens, a Christies expert on ancient manuscripts, offered some consolation. Mr. de Maraz Oyens, who knows the identity of both the seller and buyer, predicted that scholars would be given access to the work.




















Figure 58 Incident polarizing microscope photomicrograph of a hand-cut cross section through micro core sample 058 (image width $1025~\mu m$). The top layer of collagen fibers contains the brown remnant ink line from an illustration. Below this top surface layer are many layers of collagen fibers making up the thickness of the parchment. The cupping is due to the manner of sampling; the top surface and internal layers of the sample were originally flat.



























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

I Introduction¹

The Archimedes Palimpsest, referred to in Heiberg [1910–1915] as 'Codex C', had a complicated history that is understood only in part (see e.g. Netz [2000]). Originally a tenth century manuscript containing several works by Archimedes, it was palimpsested as a Greek prayer book in the twelfth or thirteenth century, and then remained unknown to the scholarly world until it was rediscovered in Istanbul at

Twenty-two hundred years ago, the great Greek mathematician Archimedes wrote a treatise called the Stomachion. Unlike his other writings, it soon fell into obscurity. Little of it survived, and no one knew what to make of it.

But now a historian of mathematics at Stanford. sifting through ancient parchment overwritten by monks and nearly ruined by mold, appears to have solved the mystery of what the treatise was about. In the process, he has opened a surprising new window on the work of the genius best remembered (perhaps apocryphally) for his cry of "Eureka!" when he discovered a clever way to determine whether a king's crown was pure gold.

The Stomachion, concludes the historian, Dr. Reviel Netz, was far ahead of its time; a treatise on combinatorics, a field that did not come into its own until the rise of computer science.

The goal of combinatorics is to determine how many ways a given problem can be solved. And finding the number of ways that the problem posed in the Stomachion (pronounced sto-MOCK-yon) can be solved is so difficult that when Dr. Netz asked a team of four combinatorics experts to do it, it took them six

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About Archimedes

WELCOME. The subject of this website is a manuscript of extraordinary importance to the history of science, the Archimedes Palimpsest. This tenth century manuscript is the unique source for two of Archimedes Treatises, The Method and Stomachion, and it is the unique source for the Greek text of On Floating Bodies. Discovered in 1906 by J.L. Heiberg, it plays a prominent role in his 1910-15 edition of the works of Archimedes, upon which all subsequent work on Archimedes has been based. The manuscript was in private hands throughout much of the twentieth century, and was sold at auction to a private collector on the 29th October 1998. The owner deposited the manuscript at The Walters Art Museum in Baltimore, Maryland, a few months later. Since that date the manuscript has been the subject of conservation, imaging and scholarship. The Archimedes Palimpsest project, as it is called, has generated a great deal of public curiosity, as well as the interest of scholars throughout the world.

This website attempts to give information on the Palimpsest, and on the progress of the project in general. It is designed to be of interest to a wide range of audiences, and many people have contributed to it. I do hope that you find answers to some of the questions you may have concerning the manuscript and the progress of the project on this site.














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W.672: Album of Ottoman Calligraphy

Walters manuscript W.672 is an album (muraqqa') of calligraphy in the form of an accordion book put together by an anonymous collector, probably in the 12th AH/AD 18th century. It consists of leaves bearing fragmentary passages from the Qur'an (Surat al-Bagarah, 2:65-68 and Surat al-Nisa', 4:103-106), some sayings of the Prophet Muhammad, and two sheets of pen exercises (karalama). Folio 5a bears the name of the celebrated Ottoman calligrapher Seyh Hamdullah (Hamd Allah al-Amasi, d. 926 AH/AD 1520).

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
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
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
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Illuminated Manuscript Map of Cairo, from Book on Navigation, Walters Ms. W.658, fol. 305b



Originally composed in 932 AH / 1525 CE and dedicated to Sultan Süleyman I ("The Magnificent"), this great work by Piri Reis (d. 962 AH / 1555 CE) on navigation was later revised and expanded. The present manuscript, made mostly in the late 11th AH / 17th CE century, is based on the later expanded version with some 240 exquisitely executed maps and portolan charts. They include a world map (fol.41a) with the outline of the Americas, as



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
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
