# Places of Syterest,

AND HOW TO REACH THEM.

CLIFF HOUSE AND SUTRO HEIGHTS.—To reach these commanding points, take Ferries and Cliff Cable-road—either on Powell or Sacramento Streets. If on Powell Street, change cars at Jackson and Mason; or take California-street cars. At terminus of either line take motor cars at California and Central Avenue, and run to end of line. Sutro Heights or the Cliff House are near at hand and in full sight. Fare ten cents—five cents on each line.

PARK AND THE OCEAN BEACH.—The Park being a place to roam, all roads (almost) lead there. The McAllister, Hayes or Haight-street cars of the Market-street system, the Geary-street, California-street, or Powell-street all reach there, on a single five-cent fare. The Post-street Line may be taken at Junction of Montgomery, Market and Post street, opposite Palace Hotel. It is well to go oneway and return another. If one goes by Powell Street,

a fine view of the Presidio is had, and the Park is entered from the North. The Conservatory is close at hand and the walk across to the children's play-ground and from thence to the Haight-street terminus a pleasant one. At this point the motor cars to the beach may be taken—fare five cents.

UNITED STATES MINT.—The Branch Mint on Fifth Street, between Market and Mission, is an interesting point to visit. A guide accompanies parties through the different departments, and the various stages of melting, refining rolling, annealing, punching and stamping into finished coin may be witnessed. Visitors admitted daily from nine to half-past eleven.

STATE MINING BUREAU.—Visitors will do well not to overlook the collection of geological and mineralogical specimens collected by the State and exhibited under the direction of the State Mineralogist in Pioneers' Building, where Conference is in Session. Free admission daily from ten to five.

Presidio.—The Military Reservation with its magnificent view of the Bay, Mount Tamalpais and the Marin shore is well worth a visit. The most satisfactory route is by the Ferries and Cliff route (Powell or Sacramento Streets to Jackson and Central Avenue.) The walk through the Presidio is very attractive and not long. Returning, take

the Union Street Cable-road, which will give you a glimpse of the old North End and the Latin Quarter.
