The association seeks to develop and strengthen the public library as an essential part of the American educational system. It therefore strives by individual effort of members, and where practicable by local organization, to stimulate public interest in establishing or improving libraries and thus to bring the best reading within the reach of all.

GROWTH AND PERMANENCE OF MEMBERSHIP.

American Library Association.

Organized Oct. 6, 1876. Incorporated Dec. 10, 1879.

This national body was organized in Philadelphia, Oct. 6, 1876, as the immediate result of a three days library conference held in connection with the Centennial exhibition. Its stated purposes were to promote library interests, and increase reciprocity and good will among librarians and those interested in library economy and bibliography.

In addition to advancing library interests generally, the A. L. A. aims:

1 By organization and force of numbers to effect needed reforms and improvements, most of which could not be brought about by individual effort.

2 By co-operation, to lessen labor and expense of library administration.

3 By discussion and comparison, to utilize the combined experiments and experience of the profession in perfecting plans and methods and in solving difficulties.

4 By meetings and correspondence, to promote acquaintance and *esprit de corps*.

As shown by the following tables, the association has steadily grown in numbers, its present membership being 800 and upwards. Since 1876, with but three exceptions, it has held annual meetings; the place of meeting having purposely been varied so as to reach many sections of the country.

As an outcome of its work and influence, divers library clubs and state library associations have been formed; state library commissions and traveling libraries have also been established in various states as a no less direct result.

In addition to benefits derived from the formal proceedings, and the papers presented at the various sessions of each general meeting, those in attendance find a direct practical value in the informal discussions and individual conferences made possible by the intervals between sessions. Similar opportunities are given by the necessity for traveling together to and from the places of meeting, and at the various social occasions connected with the conferences.

The requirements for membership in the association are specified in § 3 to 7 of the constitution. The A. L. A. cordially welcomes to its membership all friends of library progress.

Each contributing member is entitled to receive the published volume of proceedings. For those attending the annual meetings it has usually been possible to secure advantageous rates for travel and at hotels; the reduction thus obtained greatly exceeding the annual fees.

The A. L. A. constitution in its present form, was adopted at Lakewood in 1892 and ratified at Chicago in 1893. Certain important changes having since then been proposed to the association, a revision has been thought advisable, rather than numerous amendments; and the subject is now under consideration by a special committee which is expected to report in season for preliminary action at the Atlanta meeting in May.

Constitution

§ 1 *Name.* This organization shall be called the American Library Association.

§ 2 *Object.* Its object shall be to promote the welfare of libraries by stimulating public interest in founding and improving them, by securing needed state and national legislation, by furthering such co-operative work as shall improve results or reduce expenses, by exchanging views and making recommendations and by advancing the common interests of librarians, trustees, and others engaged in library and allied educational work.

Members

§ 3 *Eligibility.* Any trustee, librarian, or other person engaged in public library administration may become a member of the association by paying the annual fee and signing the constitution or a membership application blank supplied by the secretary and to be filed in the records. Other persons may in the same manner become members after election by the board. Any member paying an annual fee of five dollars shall be known as a fellow.

§ 4 *Annual fee.* The annual dues shall be two dollars for members and five dollars for fellows or institutions, payable in January.

§ 5 *Associates.* Associates may be elected by the board for a single year with all privileges of members except voting, and shall pay beside the annual fee of two dollars such fee as shall be established each year by the board for associates wishing to share in reduced rates granted to members; but no extra fee shall be required from persons in the immediate family of members.

§ 6 *Honorary members.* Honorary members nominated by the board may be elected by unanimous vote at any meeting of the association and shall be exempt from dues.

§ 7 *Life members and fellows.* Any member may become a life member or life fellow, entitled during life to all rights and privileges of membership without payment of annual dues, by payment of \$25 for life membership and \$100 for life fellowship.

Endowment Fund.

§ 8 All receipts from life memberships and all gifts for this special purpose, shall constitute an endowment fund which shall be invested and kept forever inviolate. The interest shall be expended as the council may direct. The custody of the endowment fund shall be committed to three trustees, one of whom shall be elected by ballot at each annual meeting of the association, to hold office for three years from the date of his election. No money shall be expended from the endowment fund except on check signed by a majority of the trustees.

Officers

§ 9 The officers of the association shall be a president, three vice-presidents, a secretary, a recorder, and a treasurer, to be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and to hold office until the adjournment of the meeting at which their successors are elected.

§ 10 *Executive board.* These officers, together with the president for the preceding year, shall constitute an executive board, with power to act for the association in intervals between meetings on all matters on which they reach unanimous agreement.

They shall elect from members of the association a finance committee consisting of three members, a co-operation committee of five members, and such other committees or officers as shall be required to transact the business of the association.

§ 11 *Secretary.* The secretary shall have charge of the books, papers and correspondence, and shall give due notice of any election, appointment, meeting, or other business requiring the personal attention of any member.

§ 12 *Recorder.* The recorder shall keep a faithful record of the members present at each meeting of the association, or board, and of all business transacted.

§ 13 *Treasurer.* The treasurer shall keep a full and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, with date, purpose, and amount; collect dues; pay bills, but only on written order of two members of the finance committee; and shall make an annual report.

§ 14 *Finance committee.* The finance committee shall make all needed appropriations, audit bills, and give orders on the treasurer for payment; and no expense shall be incurred on behalf of the association by any officer or committee, in excess of the appropriation made for the purpose by the finance committee.

§ 15 *Co-operation committee.* The co-operation committee shall consider and report on plans for securing improvement, economy, uniformity and harmony in any department of literary work.

§ 16 *Publishing section.* The publishing section shall consist of five members appointed by the executive board for terms of not more than three years. Its object shall be to secure the preparation and publication of such catalogs, indexes, and other bibliographic and library aids as it may approve.

The section shall annually appoint from its own number a chairman, secretary, and treasurer.

No moneys shall be paid by the treasurer except with the written approval of three other members of the section, and no work shall be undertaken except by vote of a majority of the whole section.

The treasury of the section is entirely distinct from that of the association, and the association is not liable for any debts incurred by the section. With the approval of the finance committee money may be appropriated from the treasury of the association for the running expenses of the section, but the section depends on the endowment fund as the financial basis of its undertakings.

The section shall report in writing at each annual meeting of the American Library Association.

§ 17 *Council.* There shall be a council to serve as an advisory board. No recommendation in relation to library administration shall be promulgated by the association, and no section shall be established under its name, until approved by two-thirds vote of the council.

The council shall consist of 20 members, whose term of office shall be five years. They shall be divided into five classes, so that the term of office of four members shall expire annually. Election for their successors shall be by ballot of the association at the annual meeting, from eight nominees selected by the council by ballot. All other vacancies shall be filled by the council for the unexpired terms.

Meetings

§ 18 *Regular meetings.* There shall be an annual meeting at such time and place as may have been decided on by the association, or board, and the secretary shall send notice to every member of the association at least one month before meeting.

§ 19 *Special meetings.* Special meetings of the association shall be called by the president on request of 10 or more members, provided that one month's previous notice be duly given, and that only business specified in the call shall be transacted.

Meetings of the board may be called by the president or by a majority of its members.

§ 20 *Quorum.* Twenty active members shall constitute a quorum.

§ 21 *Votes by correspondence.* Any resolution approved in writing by every member of the board or of any committee shall have the force of a vote.

Amendments and By-Laws

§ 22 *Amendments.* This constitution may be amended by three-fourths vote at two successive meetings of the association, provided that each member shall be notified of the proposed amendment at least one month before its final adoption.

§ 23 *Adoption and amendment.* Any by-law not inconsistent with this constitution may be adopted or amended by three-fourths vote at two successive meetings.

§ 24 *Suspension and repeal.* Any by-law may be suspended by unanimous vote at any meeting, but shall be repealed only by three-fourths vote at two successive meetings.

By-Laws

§ 1 *Eligibility of president.* The same person shall not be elected president for two consecutive terms.

§ 2 *Program.* No paper shall be read before a meeting of the association till it has been examined by the board, or a program committee appointed by it, which shall decide whether it is to be read entire or by abstract, or to be submitted for printing in full or in abstract, or rejected.

§ 3 *Resolutions and arrangements.* The board shall appoint for each general meeting a local committee to have in charge all local arrangements under the direction of the board, or program committee, and also a resolutions committee, to

prepare for the association needed votes of thanks and other resolutions; and all resolutions offered by members shall be referred to this committee for any desirable revision before final action is taken thereon by the association.

§ 4 The executive board should provide a printed ballot containing not less than three nominees for each office, including any names filed with the secretary 48 hours before the election by five members of the association.

Sections

By means of a system of sections the practical usefulness of the A. L. A. meetings has been considerably enlarged. The section meetings, while open to all, provide especially for the needs of each class of workers, and afford more opportunity for the discussion of details. The regular, or undivided, sessions are thus left free for subjects of general interest and the consideration of routine matters concerning the entire association.

Provision is usually made for the following section sessions: Small libraries, devoted to elementary work and the interests of libraries and their special problems.

Large libraries, for the more extensive city libraries and their special problems.

College and reference libraries, for those of educational institutions and the questions pertaining to reference rather than circulating collections.

State and law libraries, whose interests on some points are considerably allied.

Trustees section, to consider questions pertain-

ing more to the governing boards than to administrative officers.

Three of those sections maintain a formal organization from year to year, and take under consideration questions relating more particularly to their own province. They are as follows:

The College and Reference Section

which dates from a first meeting of the college librarians held in 1889. Since then, meetings have been held regularly.

The State Library Section

was one of the first organized in connection with this association. The most important library problem now before the country is the relation of the state to libraries. This includes legislation, state aid, exemption from taxation, public documents and their distribution, organization of the library interests of each state, library commissions, traveling libraries, and indeed every question concerning the state's relation to library interests.

The Trustees Section

has had a permanent organization since the meeting of 1890.

More boards of trustees are each year recognizing the practical value of having their librarians attend the meetings, allowing them not only the time, but also necessary expenses in many cases. Equally significant is the increasing number of trustees who find that it pays to attend the A. L. A. meetings themselves. By comparing views, and advising with each other on their peculiar duties, mutual aid is rendered towards the effi-

cient discharge of the public trust committed to them. Some of the meetings of trustees are held jointly with the librarians interested in supervisory problems; at others trustees only are present, thus favoring the joint and separate discussion of salaries, laws, vacations, rules for the staff, and other questions in which librarians have a personal interest that modify their judgment.

PUBLISHING SECTION

The A. L. A. also maintains a publishing section (see § 16 of constitution) dating from 1886, which has charge of the preparation and publishing of such catalogs, indexes, and other bibliographic and library aids, as the association may from time to time undertake.

ENDOWMENT FUND

Following the meeting of 1890, and through the efforts of the trustees section to collect a permanent fund "for publishing the proceedings of the association," the endowment fund was established. It has now increased to \$6,000, and should be enlarged to \$100,000, so that the income would allow much other important and useful work to be done.

The fund itself is kept inviolate, and the income "expended as the council may direct."

A. L. A. AT THE COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION

A very important work accomplished by the association was the library exhibit at the Columbian exposition in 1893, which included a model library of 5,000 volumes for an average com-

munity, and a catalog of the library in both classified and dictionary form. Many thousand copies of the *Catalog of "A. L. A." Library* have since then been distributed by the United States Bureau of Education, Washington, D. C., in co-operation with which the exhibit was made. The A. L. A. library was afterward deposited with that Bureau, while the comparative exhibit, prepared at the same time, was placed with the State library at Albany, N. Y., in its library school.

CO-OPERATION WITH NATIONAL EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION

The National Educational Association established in 1896 a library department; thus recognizing the fact that in any satisfactory system of education libraries are as essential as public schools. A more effective co-operation between public libraries and public schools, with a consequent increased appreciation of good literature, may be hoped for from such action.

At the request of the former association the A. L. A. appoints a standing committee whose work is to facilitate and strengthen co-operation between the two bodies.

Allied Agencies

With the A. L. A. three agencies are allied, whose influence and value have been perhaps even greater than its own immediate action, though they are not under its control.

1 *Library Journal*. This is the official organ of the association, a monthly exponent of library

progress, whose volumes constitute a bibliothecal work now recognized as a necessity in every progressive library and as unexcelled in any language. It is published at 59 Duane St., New York, and the subscription price is \$5 per year.

2 *Library Bureau*. This organization has had no organic connection with the A. L. A. since the first three years of its existence; but, carried on in full harmony with its spirit and aims, is an instrument through which co-operative schemes may be realized, and an agency for the supply of all library wants except books and periodicals.

In addition to manufacturing many technical library fittings and supplies, it also publishes at \$1 a year a monthly magazine, *Public Libraries*, which deals with all phases of library work in a concise, simple way, such as will aid, encourage, and inspire small libraries. The main office of the Library Bureau is at 530 Atlantic Ave., Boston; with various branches in the larger cities of the country, as well as abroad.

3 *Library schools*. The establishment of several schools of library training, within the past decade, is one of the most striking evidences of recent library progress. The pioneer and present leader in this field is the New York State Library School, carried on by the University of the State of New York at Albany, originally established in 1887 at Columbia College under the direction of Melvil Dewey, its present director. The school offers a two years course and confers the degree of bachelor of library science (B. L. S.).

The other library schools are: Pratt Institute Library School, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Miss Mary W. Plummer, director.

Drexel Institute Library School, Philadelphia; Miss Alice B. Kroeger, director.

University of Illinois Library School, Champaign, Ill.; Miss Katharine L. Sharp, director.

In addition, the Sauveur Summer School, Amherst, Mass., has for several years conducted a summer school of library economy, of which Mr. W. I. Fletcher, of Amherst College Library, is director; and similar summer courses in library training have been established by the University of Wisconsin, the University of Ohio, and the New York State Library School.

NOTE.—In the states above named, the established commissions are able to offer more or less

aid to new libraries by means of advice, money, books, traveling library systems, or other helpful and encouraging features.

It is to be expected that other states will follow their example. In California, Colorado, Illinois, New Jersey, Indiana, and Kentucky, the legislatures have already been asked to establish such commissions. Meanwhile assistance to school or other libraries has been given through the board of education or state library, in California, Maine, and Rhode Island.

New York has a Public Libraries Department of the University under Melvil Dewey, state librarian and director, devoted entirely to promoting public library interests. That department fills the place occupied by the commission in other states.
