Celebrate Library Card Sign-Up Month

September is Library Card Sign-up Month and new [downloadable tools](#) along with print and digital public service announcements (PSAs) are now available. Tools include a sample press release, op-ed, proclamation, PSA scripts and radio quality PSAs. Legendary comic creator Stan Lee is serving as the Honorary Chair of Library Card Sign-up Month in September. Stan Lee taped a brief interview with PIO/Campaign staff and shared these comments: “Having a library card, it’s like having a key to all the information in the world. When you have a library card you can read anything about anything, and I have found that whatever you read, it doesn’t matter – it increases your fund of knowledge. So a library card is the ‘Open Sesame’ to all the knowledge in the world.” Lee has also agreed to promote Library Card Sign-Up Month through his social media channels.

Nearly 100 Percent of Public Libraries Offer Tech Training and Workforce Programs, Study Finds

According to a new ALA study, nearly 100 percent of America’s public libraries offer workforce development training programs, online job resources, and technology skills training. Overall, libraries report technology improvements—including nearly ubiquitous public Wi-Fi, growing mobile resources and a leap in e-book access—but the ALA’s 2014 Digital Inclusion Survey also documents digital differences among states and an urban/rural divide. Unique to this study are the Interactive mapping tools that combine digital inclusion survey and community-level data. The map enables libraries to better understand their community demographics, education and learning, economic/workforce, and health contexts along with the digital inclusion services that they provide. The study is funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and conducted by the ALA Office for Research & Statistics and the Information Policy & Access Center at the University of Maryland College Park. Workforce Bill Passes, Includes Libraries

In July, President Barack Obama signed the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, a law that will open access to federal funding support to public libraries for effective job training and job search programs. ALA President Courtney Young applauded the presidential signing of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act in a statement. ALA thanks Senator Jack Reed (D-RI) and Representative Rush Holt (D-NJ) for their efforts to include libraries in the legislation.

ALA Active on Surveillance and Privacy Issues

ALA continues to work closely and aggressively in tandem with partners in several coalitions to reform the multiple statutes that provide the government with various forms of surveillance and investigatory authority. In June, ALA joined more than 30 other civil liberties and privacy organizations in writing to key members of the Senate to support the modification of the USA FREEDOM Act so that it truly ends the “bulk collection” of telephone business records, and builds transparency and additional oversight into court-approved surveillance activities.

Simon & Schuster Expands ebook Lending Program

In June, Simon & Schuster revealed that it will expand its pilot library ebook lending program to serve all U.S. libraries. Immediate Past President Barbara Stripling responded to the ebook expansion by releasing a press statement indicating ALA encouragement of the continued progress on the library ebook front, though noting much work remains to be done.

2014 Andrew Carnegie Medals for Excellence

Booklist and RUSA hosted the [2014 Andrew Carnegie Medals for Excellence](#) award ceremony at the ALA Annual Conference. Both medal winners, Doris Kearns Goodwin and Donna Tartt, were present to accept their awards in person. Nancy Pearl served as emcee, and celebrated crime fiction author and library champion Karin Slaughter delighted audiences with her keynote speech. Kearns Goodwin received the nonfiction medal for *The Bully Pulpit* and Tartt received the fiction medal for *The Goldfinch*. A dessert and cocktail reception followed, where guests mingled with all three authors. In addition to coverage of the announcements in many national media outlets, more than 451,000 Web pickups were noted. (see also RUSA coverage in this Report)

AASL Transforms Learning with New Mission Statement and Strategic Plan

AASL challenges leaders in all fields to bring about an evolution in student learning with its adoption of a new mission statement and strategic plan. During the 2014 ALA Annual Conference in Las Vegas, the AASL Board of Directors unanimously voted to approve the mission statement: *The American Association of School Librarians empowers leaders to transform teaching and learning.*

PLA Board Approves Updated Strategic Plan

At the 2014 ALA Annual Conference, the PLA Board of Directors approved an updated strategic plan that builds on PLA’s success to date, regarding two strategic goal areas in particular — Advocacy & Awareness and Leadership & Transformation—and focuses the association for the next three years. The desired outcome of the planning process is to guide and create clarity on how PLA should invest its valuable and limited resources to meet the future needs of its members and other stakeholders. International Relations

International Federation of Library Associations (IFLA)

Programs and discussions at the recent IFLA Congress in Lyon, France in August focused on a number of important international developments: These included the [IFLA Trends Report](#), which outlines trends that will shape the future environment for libraries around the world. With the United Nations now working on a new set of "post 2015" developmental goals that will apply to both developing and developed nations, the [Lyon Declaration](#) is part of a worldwide push to see that access to information and the libraries that enable it are central to the new vision. ALA was one of the early signers of the declaration. ALA President Courtney Young has also signed a new memorandum of understanding with the German Library Association, which involves cooperation in conference programs and opens the way to increased exchange. In addition, there is a lot of excitement over the announcement that the 2016 IFLA congress will be held in Columbus, Ohio. Pat Losinski of the Columbus Metropolitan Library and Carol Diedrichs of Ohio State University will be serving as co-chairs of the US National Planning Committee.

Membership Development

Membership Count

The ALA membership count as of July 31, 2014 was 56,280. Four divisions and four Round Tables had membership increases compared to July 2013.

Membership Development Activities

- Joint ALA-Chapter student membership packages exceeded last year's July count by 179.
- At the 2014 Annual Conference the Membership Committee, the Budget Analysis and Review Committee (BARC), and the Executive Board approved a special FY15 promotion to encourage lapsed very small and small libraries to rejoin ALA. The promotion will launch in mid-September.
- A pilot project has begun to produce joint ALA-division membership brochures in conjunction with AASL, ACRL, and PLA to present unified membership messages and to reinforce our strengths in order to encourage recruitment and retention. Over time, joint brochures will be developed in conjunction with all divisions. Additionally, ALA is exploring other joint recruitment/retention marketing programs with the divisions.
- Ongoing membership development activities include quarterly e-mail (Informz) campaigns to lapsed and prospective organizational members and monthly e-mail campaigns to lapsed and prospective personal members.

- The quarterly e-publication, MVP (Member Value Programs) Digest, which helps members be more aware of their ALA tangible benefits, will be distributed to all members in October.

Office for Government Relations (OGR)

Presidential Contender Sen. Jim Webb, FCC Leaders Address ALA Annual Conference

During the 2014 ALA Annual Conference, former Virginia Senator Jim Webb discussed the upcoming national election season and the ways that the elections will affect libraries and library funding. Called a “potential presidential candidate” by *The Washington Post*, Sen. Webb has been a combat Marine, a counsel in Congress, an assistant secretary of defense and Secretary of the Navy, an Emmy-award winning journalist, an accomplished filmmaker and an author of ten books. During the ALA Annual Conference, the Washington Office secured a video from the Chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, Tom Wheeler. In the [video](#), the Chairman speaks about the changing nature of libraries today, emphasizing the importance of providing access to digital resources, technology, and free public Wi-Fi. Finally, Gigi Sohn, special counsel for External Affairs to Chairman Wheeler, met with PLA leadership, representatives from Chief Officers of State Library Agencies (COSLA), the Association for Rural and Small Libraries (ARSL), the OITP Advisory Committee, and the ALA E-rate task force to discuss E-rate details and the nature of library services in today’s and tomorrow’s libraries. In addition to these meetings, Gigi Sohn took a field trip to the main library of the Las Vegas-Clark County Library District, where she saw a model of what libraries can offer their communities.

ALA and Coalition Members Release Net Neutrality Principles

In July, ALA, along with other library and higher education organizations representing thousands of colleges, universities, and libraries nationwide, released a set of net neutrality principles to inform the Federal Communications Commission’s (FCC) decision to protect the openness of the Internet. The principles describe how network neutrality protections are essential to protecting freedom of speech, educational achievement, and economic growth.

ALA Applauds Unanimous Ruling in Two Civil Liberties Cases

In June, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously upheld the Fourth Amendment when they ruled in *David Leon Riley v. State of California* and *United States v. Brima Wurie* that officers of the law must obtain warrants before they can search the cellphones of arrestees. The two cases began when police officers searched the cell phones of defendants Riley and Wurie without obtaining a warrant. The searches recovered texts, videos, photos, and telephone numbers that were later used as evidence. Earlier in March, the American Library Association and the Internet Archive filed a “friend of the court” brief in *David Leon Riley v. State of California* and *United States v. Brima Wurie*.

ALA Sends Letter to Data Advisory Council

ALA sent a letter to the director of the Office of Digital Engagement at the Department of Commerce to encourage the agency to include the appointment of a librarian on the new Data Advisory Council. The letter stated: “The role of a librarian is to organize and deliver information in a usable, timely and accessible way; while aiding the public in utilizing that information as needed. Not only have librarians long handled government data, but they are always seeking new and better ways to fulfill the public’s need of that information. The knowledge that librarians have of both accessing and utilizing data, would be of great benefit to the Department of Commerce.”

Over-Filtering in Schools and Libraries Harms Education, New ALA Report Finds

Schools and libraries nationwide are routinely filtering internet content far more than what the Children’s Internet Protection Act requires, according to “Fencing Out Knowledge: Impacts of the Children’s Internet Protection Act 10 Years Later,” a report released by the ALA Office for Information Technology Policy (OITP) and the ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom (OIF) in June. “Fencing Out Knowledge” is based on a year-long study that included a two-day symposium during the summer of 2013 and other research. ALA Welcomes Forward Movement on E-Rate Modernization

In July, the FCC voted to release the first Order as part of its E-rate modernization proceeding. “This Order represents a solid first step toward increasing library participation in the E-rate program and moving our communities toward the gigabit speeds increasingly needed to support Wi-Fi, digital learning and multimedia collections,” said ALA President Courtney Young. “More than a year of hard work and advocacy on behalf of our nation’s 16,400 public libraries and the communities they serve has brought us to this point, and I’m proud of what ALA and its library and school partners have achieved.”

ALA Collaborates with Senator Byron Dorgan to Publish Op-ed in *Roll Call*

“America doesn’t move ahead by leaving some behind,” former Senator Byron Dorgan wrote in an article published in June in [Roll Call](#), where he made the case that the FCC should bolster its support for high-speed internet infrastructure development in rural American communities. In the article, Sen. Dorgan advocated for increased support for E-rate, the program that helps schools and libraries obtain affordable vital Internet access and advanced telecommunications services. The op-ed was developed under the rubric of ALA’s *Policy Revolution!* initiative, a national public policy agenda and action plan for U.S. libraries supported by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. The Committee on Research & Statistics featured Lee Rainey (Director, Internet, Science and Technology, at the Pew Research Center) at AC14. Rainey presented, to an audience of 300+, the Project’s new study about the different kinds of library users and non-users. The research uses segmentation models to show how technology, community orientation, and library activities affect the way people use libraries. Rainey introduced a free tool, [“What kind of library user are you?”](#), that public libraries may use to gather data about their own library users and non-users. .

Application Deadline Extended for *Shakespeare and His First Folio*

The deadline for the traveling exhibition [Shakespeare and His First Folio](#) has been extended to October 24. More than 100 libraries, colleges and universities, museums and other cultural organizations have already started applications on PPO’s online application portal. Extending the deadline allows ALA and its partners to select from a range of qualified sites. The traveling exhibition — part of the international events planned for 2016, the 400th anniversary of William Shakespeare’s death — will bring a 1623 original edition of the playwright’s first published collection, along with six interpretive panels, to 53 sites: one site in all 50 United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The exhibition is offered in collaboration with the Folger Shakespeare Library and the Cincinnati Museum Center with support from the National Endowment for the Humanities: Exploring the human endeavor.

Applications Now Accepted for *Exploring Human Origins* Traveling Exhibition

PPO, in collaboration with the Smithsonian’s National Museum of Natural History Human Origins Program, is accepting applications for the traveling exhibition [Exploring Human Origins](#). The exhibition seeks to create an opportunity for a wide spectrum of audiences to engage the

complex field of human evolution research in ways that are understandable, fulfilling, captivating and relevant. Nineteen public libraries will be selected to host the 40-panel, 1,200-square-foot exhibition for four weeks each between April 2015 and April 2017. Applications are due November 19. The traveling exhibition is based on the [Smithsonian exhibition *What Does It Mean to Be Human?*](#), which opened in 2010; over 20 million people have visited the Hall of Human Origins exhibition since its opening. *Exploring Human Origins* is made possible through the support of a grant from the John Templeton Foundation.

Two Schools Receive \$50,000 Catastrophic Disaster Relief Grants

Paul Robeson Malcolm X Academy in Detroit and Rowe Elementary School in Rowe, MA, are the recipients of the [2014 catastrophic disaster relief grants](#) offered as part of the AASL Beyond Words Grant, funded by the Dollar General Literacy Foundation. In 2012, Dollar General renewed its commitment to school libraries by increasing Beyond Words grant amounts and introducing two \$50,000 catastrophic disaster relief grants. To qualify for a catastrophic award, eligible schools suffered a 90 percent or greater loss to the school library program due to a natural disaster, fire or an act recognized by the federal government as terrorism.

- “Using Massive Digital Libraries” examines “what Ryan James and (Andrew Weiss) in previous studies have together defined as massive digital libraries (MDLs). ... A massive digital library is a collection of organized information large enough to rival the size of the world’s largest bricks-and-mortar libraries in terms of book collections. The examples examined in this book range from hundreds of thousands of books to tens of millions. This basic definition ... is a starting point for discussion. As the book progresses this definition is refined further to make it more usable and relevant. This book will introduce more characteristics of MDLs and examine how they affect the current traditional library.”

upcoming FY15, on consortia, national libraries, and smaller cataloging departments for maximum impact in both RDA implementation and RDA Toolkit subscriptions.
