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WOMEN IN THIRD WORLD COUNTRIES: Research Trends and Collection Development Challenges

The first official program of the Women's Studies Section was held at ALA New Orleans on Saturday, July 9. The two goals of the program were to enable librarians to hear what faculty research trends are in various geographic areas and to share information on how to obtain materials from those regions. After a brief welcome from Ellen Broidy, then Chair of WSS, and an introduction by Pat Kreitz, 1988 Program Committee Chair, keynote speaker Dr. Kate Cloud, University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, presented her paper, "Through a Glass, Darkly: Women and World Change." The status of women in developing countries and the kinds of statistical data needed to identify and to study changes in women's public and private lives were provocatively discussed.

Dr. Cloud was followed by three faculty/researchers who described current research trends in their fields and identified the kinds of primary source materials that will be needed in the next decade. Dr. Asuncion Lavrin, Howard University, discussed research trends in Latin American studies; Dr. Jyotsna Vaid, Texas A&M University, discussed research trends in South and Southeast Asian studies; and Dr. Pauline Manaka, Georgia State University, discussed research paradigms in African studies. A panel of three collection development specialists (Merry Burlingham, University of Texas at Austin, Thomas Niehaus, Tulane University, and Beth Stafford, University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign) described the resources available to help librarians obtain research materials for women's studies from Latin America, Africa, and South/Southeast Asia.

Evaluations from the over sixty attendees rated the program and the participants very highly. Dr. Cloud was praised as being "marvelous--well

organized, interesting, provocative, useful." The audience appreciated the way researchers and librarians were brought together and how the program provided a balance between theory and practical information.

The Women's Studies Section extends thanks to ACRL/ALA for financial assistance in producing the program, the librarian participants for the generous contribution of their time, and to the 1988 New Orleans Program Planning Committee (Pat Kreitz, Deb Biggs, Nancy Magnuson, Jacquelyn Marie, Molly Mahony, Susan Perry, and Beth Ellen Woodward) for their hard work and creativity in making the program such a success.

WSS COMMITTEE REPORTS

Communications Committee

Based on a decision at Midwinter in San Antonio, the committee provides follow-up contact with WSS meeting visitors via a welcome letter to promote participation in the section. This effort has aided in adding new members to our roster.

Tentative program ideas include: the impact of cataloging and classification on research in women's studies; preservation issues for women's studies collections and sources; introduction to the "basics" of women's studies librarianship. WSS Ad Hoc Conspectus Committee

The draft of the RLG Conspectus for women's studies was reviewed by the committee at Annual in New Orleans. Positive publicity about the meeting appeared in the LJ/SLJ Conference Daily and in Library Journal.

A revised draft was submitted in September to the RLG Conspectus Subcommittee and will be on the agenda at their Midwinter meeting on Friday,

January 6. If approved, the women's studies conspectus will become an official publication of the Research Libraries Group and will be distributed to all RLG member libraries, as well as being available to other libraries and individuals through RLG offices.

Founded in 1981, the Museum has a collection of over 500 works, including paintings, sculpture, pottery, prints, drawings, books, and photographs from the Renaissance to the present.

(Open daily except Mon., Free)

This National Historic Landmark is a memorial to Alice Paul, founder of the National Woman's Party and author of the ERA. It contains a museum of suffrage and equal rights activities as well as a portrait gallery of the contemporary women's rights movement.

CALL FOR VOLUNTEER READERS

The **BELKAN Autobiography Project** is currently underway at the Institute for Research on Women and Gender at Stanford University. Susan Groag Bell and Barbara (Penny) Kanner, the co-directors of the project, have received a two-year grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to publish an annotated bibliography of British women's autobiographies written or published between 1790-1950.

More volunteer (unpaid) readers are needed to read some 2,000 books and manuscripts and to help develop the annotations for inclusion in the BELKAN Database. NEWS NOTES

The WSS proposal for a two-part program at the ACRL Fifth National Conference was accepted. Plan to be in Cincinnati, April 5-8, 1989, to take part in these sessions devoted to "Women's Studies in Academic Libraries." Joan Ariel (Univ. of California, Irvine) will moderate a panel on "Current Research and Implications for Service." Susan Searing (Univ. of Wisconsin System) will report the results of a study that mapped the information seeking behavior of women's studies researchers. Ellen Brody (Univ. of California, Irvine) will address the particular challenges for bibliographic instruction in women's studies. Deb Biggs (Univ. of Michigan) will present the perspective of an information, research and counseling center for non-traditional students. Focusing on women's studies, the panel will illuminate the central role of academic libraries in encouraging interdisciplinary scholarship and innovation in curricular and research agendas.

The second part of the program will be an open forum for sharing experiences, problems and solutions in the areas of collection development, faculty liaison, reference service, bibliographic instruction, subject cataloging, and classification. Faculty from the University of Cincinnati's Women's Studies Program will be invited to join us.

The National Women's Studies Association's eleventh annual conference, "Feminist Transformations," will be held at Towson State University in Baltimore, MD, from June 14-18, 1989.

The Michigan State University Women's Studies Program is planning a program on "Re-Visioning Women's Studies Curriculum" which is to be held in the spring of 1990. Details on speakers is forthcoming. The National Council for Research on Women has received a three-year grant from the Pew Charitable Trust to develop a work-in-progress database in collaboration with the Research Libraries Group and the Schlesinger Library, a Council member center and special member of RLG. The new database will be available in mid 1989 and will be accessible online in RLIN, the Research Libraries Information Network. A Women's Thesaurus will be the primary source of terms and keywords used to describe citations submitted to the database.

The University of Tulsa Comparative Literature Symposium, titled "Redefining Marginality," has changed dates. The new dates of the conference are March 30-31 and April 1, 1989.

FROM THE HEAD OF THE TABLE

Study of gender issues has become a salient feature of a wide variety of academic disciplines, reflecting the profound impact that women's studies has had in a relatively short period of time. It's clear that interest in women's studies is still increasing--among academics, grass-roots workers and organizers, as well as among librarians.

While WSS is composed mainly of librarians in academic settings, membership is open to all librarians with an interest in the field. Much women's studies education and research is accomplished by grass-roots groups or independent scholars as well as by those in academic or research environments. Therefore, the Section aims to stay conscious of our roots and aware of challenges as they arise.

One of several projects the Section has already sponsored is a survey of library services, vis-a-vis women's studies, in U.S. institutions of higher education. Partial results of that survey will be included in our Dallas Conference program. A more complete examination of results will appear in library literature in 1989.

Another Section activity is a survey on how LC subject headings are used in the area of women's studies which our Technical Services Committee is currently designing.

We welcome you to share your ideas and concerns with us at our Midwinter Meetings and beyond.
