Miriam Dudley Bibliographic Librarian Award recipient named

Hannelore Rader, director of the University Library at Cleveland State University, is the 1993 recipient of the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL) Miriam Dudley Bibliographic Instruction Librarian Award.

The award, \$1,000 donated by Mountainside Publishing Co. on behalf of its publication *Research Strategies: A Journal of Library Concepts and Instruction*, honors the woman whose pioneering efforts in the field of BI led to the formation of ACRL's Bibliographic Instruction Section (BIS). It recognizes an individual librarian who has made an especially significant contribution to the advancement of bibliographic instruction at a college or research institution.

"Hannelore Rader has made outstanding contributions to the disciplines of bibliographic instruction and information literacy through her research, publication, presentations, teaching, mentoring and leadership in professional associations," said Mary Ellen Litzinger, chair of the Miriam Dudley Bibliographic Librarian Award Committee. "Through her participation in national and international library affair, Hannelore serves as a role model for all librarians involved with bibliographic instruction.

"Under Hannelore's leadership, Cleveland State University Library's BI program has gained national recognition for its innovation and creativity in promoting information literacy.

"In addition to her many publications and presentations on bibliographic instruction and information literacy, Hannelore was instrumental in establishing Project LOEX - one of the first clearinghouses for user education materials in the country, Litzinger added. "During her presidency of ACRL in 1986-87, she focused on the development of faculty-librarian partnerships for bibliographic instruction."

Rader has served in her present position since 1987. She previously served as director of the Library/Learning Center at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside and in various positions in Eastern Michigan University.

She has a bachelor's degree in Russian and Spanish, a master's degree in library science and a master's degree in German literature -- all from the University of Michigan.

The award will be presented on Sunday, June 27, at the ACRL Bibliographic Instruction Section program during the American Library Association (ALA) Annual Conference in New Orleans.

ACRL is a division of the American Library Association.
