One of the concerns I have heard from librarians relates to one of their primary missions: preservation. As an author, I share this concern. It's been said that literature is writing that fifty years after the author's death is forced upon high-school students by their teachers, who strive to explain what the author meant when he wrote "the sky is blue." But fifty years after my death, the world will likely be a different place, with different readers and different devices. So how will my digital content survive? 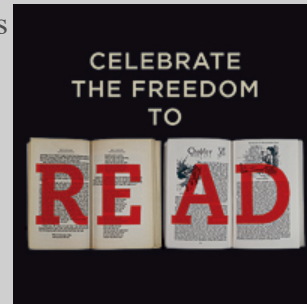
