- II. Scope notes
  - A. Jansenist style bindings
    1. Approved scope note: Use for bindings distinguished by austere exteriors with minimal decoration as contrasted with elaborately decorated doublures or turn-ins. The style originated in late 17th-century France and is named after the followers of Catholic thinker Cornelius Jansen.
  - B. Leather doublures
    1. Approved scope note: Use for the ornamental leather linings on the inside of boards that take the place of usual pastedowns or flyleaves.
    2. Also approved a scope note for Doublures: Use for the ornamental linings on the inside of boards that take the place of usual pastedowns or flyleaves. These linings are often made of leather but may also be of cloth or decorated paper.
  - C. Alum tawed thongs

1. Approved scope note: Use for narrow strips of animal skin, prepared with alum and salts in order to produce a durable and typically white material, used as sewing supports

D. Thongs

1. Approved scope note: Use for narrow strips of rawhide or processed animal skin (such as alum tawed, leather, or vellum) used as sewing supports

- E. Additionally, the group agreed to add an explanatory parenthetical to the term Thongs as well as its narrower terms
